









The 129th Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championships

19-27 August 2011 saw us firing the 129th Annual Prize Meeting at Connaught Ranges, just about as late in August as is possible due to calendar quirks. A total of 215 shooters fired the MacDonald Stewart Grand Aggregate, consisting of 196 TR shooters and 19 F-Class shooters. With 2011 being the Palma year, we saw lower attendance from some of our Canadian and American regulars as they were no doubt shepherding their resources for Brisbane a couple of months later (and please let me take this opportunity to congratulate Great Britain for winning the 2011 Palma Match in Brisbane). We also had individual shooters from the UK, Hong Kong, Jamaica and Bermuda. The Cadet program provided us with nearly 100 shooters from their staff, the Canadian ACLIM and NRT shooters, and the visiting British ACF and Athelings shooters.

A last minute unwelcome change to our shooting programme this year was the imposition by Connaught Ranges of a delay of the start shooting on Saturdays and Sundays to 09:00 from our usual and preferred 08:00 start, due to noise complaints. We ended up coping with this, mostly, by adding extra time to the mess's lunch and dinner hours, and shifting our day's shooting schedule one hour later. We didn't have to cut any shooting but it did make for three of our days finishing an hour later than we would have otherwise preferred, which included darker and also calmer conditions during the 17:00-18:00 time period.

We welcomed two international visiting teams to Connaught this year, one from Britain captained by David Richards and one from USA captained by Scott Fulmer. Unfortunately the USA team was hit quite hard by the absence of many shooters who were headed to Brisbane, for a while earlier in the year it looked like they might not be able to field a full Commonwealth team but in the end they managed.

It is at this point that I would like to personally thank David Richards, Captain of the British Team, for his "intransigence" during our discussions amongst the Canada Match teams captains of how to best deal with the loss of one hour of shooting time from the morning of 2nd-Saturday. He was quite adamant that we should not cut any of the match's distance otherwise the match would be seriously damaged and this would probably carry on to future years' firings as well. In the end I saw the light of reason and we simply fired the entire Canada match, all distances and all shots, and shifted all of 2nd-Saturday's afternoon shooting and

The NSCC competitions enjoyed a healthy increase this year due to the continued efforts of Keith Cunningham, Linda Miller and their dedicated and experienced volunteer support staff. The DCRA fully appreciates their continued efforts offering competitors a chance to test their basic marksmanship skills in countless scenarios, many of which offer further training that may be utilized throughout the CFSAC competitions. Many CF teams are able to use the NSCC matches as a warm-up prior to the CFSAC matches so the scheduling of these matches is a benefit to interested competitors.

prize presentations by one hour. Britain showed their thanks by winning the Canada Match, 1193.156V nearly one point and nearly six Vs per shooter over Canada 1188.121V and USA 1183.125V; well done Britain.

The Commonwealth Match was won by Canada 1181.105V over Britain 1179.117V and USA 1132.79V.

In individual shooting Kent Reeve of the USA won the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate - for the second year in a row no less. Well done, Kent! The Grand was also won in F-Open by Leo d'Amour (Laval, QC) and in F-Farquharson by Oleg Koutchine (Kanata, ON).

The Governor General's Prize was won by John Warburton of the GB Rifle Team with the only clean score fired, 300.34V. The F-Class Final was won in F-Open by Leo D'Amour and F-F by Kenny Proulx (Mascouche, QC).

The Canadian Target Rifle Championship was won by Ian Hogg of Stratford, PEI with a 969.121V. This agg is the primary means of selecting the Canadian Rifle Team to Bisley.

2011 wraps up our three year trial of ICFRA rules, which has turned out to have been pretty much a non-event. Our rules for 2012 and beyond will be determined by the DCRA Executive at a meeting this December; shooters should expect a similar non-event.

Over the years F-Class participation at the Canadian Championships has not grown as we might have reasonably wished. It could be that our existing way of offering the same course of fire to F-Class shooters as to TR shooters is "broken" and perhaps this could be fixed. Quite a bit of discussion took place both amongst the DCRA Executive Committee members as well as the F-Class shooters during the week. Arising from this a committee of F-Class shooters has been appointed to investigate this and to perhaps devise a shorter programme of shooting for the Canadian F Class Championships that might attract substantially better participation.

We also had 21 Black Powder shooters firing our BP championships at the beginning of our nine days of shooting.

Making the nine days of annual shooting championships work smoothly is a pretty big undertaking requiring a fair bit of organization from quite a few people. Fortunately our machine is quite well oiled and we have had to deal with only a few new things each year while carrying forward much of our institutional expertise. I would like to echo Des' acknowledgment of our wonderful staff.

There are numerous initiatives that have been underway throughout the summer and fall season. For example, the F Class discipline has been re-aligned with Terry Perkins now as the Chairman. He now has a dedicated group from across the country who contribute to the F Class committee with many of them stepping up to sit on numerous sub-committees when discussion or decisions are required. We are also looking at expanding the Indoor program this winter through the initiatives of Peter Westlake, Roger Romses and the office staff. Additional competitions have been included this year and the program is being expanded with the support of the Legion and the national Cadet offices in Ottawa. Additional committees will be revised in the next few months to take on longer term issues including membership and fundraising. I'd like to wish all the very best during the holiday season.

BLACK POWDER MATCH 2011

In Appreciation

The 2011 DCRA Black Powder Competition realized the best A attendance in several years, and also the incorporation of its results in DCRA Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championship statistics for the first time. Thanks are in order to the DCRA office staff, Mike Corcoran and Kirill Stepanov for providing the results in timely fashion (and relieving me of the thankless task of attempting to do the same with my limited computer skills), and the DCRA Range staff, especially our RO and ARO, for putting up an abundance of "Message 4" requests. Recognition is also due to Dave Gullo of Buffalo Arms for again generously donating a prize presented to the highest scoring 1st time participant and thanks to Sandy Post for a wonderful endorsement of our matches in a leading BP enthusiast magazine. Sandy, along with Mark McElrea, Mat Post and Ted Rosene donated a coffee maker to the DCRA office for the use of all (if you had a coffee on the porch during the matches, thank the Drygulchers), and finally Sean O'Keefe for his photographic and culinary talents.

...and the winners are...

Friday offered the best weather over 3 ½ days of shooting which was doubtless a factor contributing to the number of record scores in the matches making up the Short Range Aggregate. Shooting began with the Wilf Black match for military rifles, won by Frank Monikowski (with a Springfield), followed by Glenn Kaye (Peabody) and Chris Jones in third (again with a Springfield). Of the remaining matches, notable scores were posted by the winners of the 300-yard Victorian (Ray Hanson of the US with a 49v4/50) and the 600-yard Wimbledon (Dave Gullo with 49v3/50). I believe both to be record scores for the DCRA BP matches.



Saturday dawned bright and warm but deteriorated after lunch with a torrential downpour interrupting the beginning of the 900m stage of the competition. Again, high scores were the order of the day, in particular that of Canadian Dennis Reive. A newcomer in his first long range competition Dennis shot an 800m 44v3, missing the first-place Gold medal by one point and preventing an American sweep of the Long Range events.

The second day saw the end of individual competition and determination of the winners of the Short Range, Long Range and Grand Aggregates. The Short Range Aggregate was taken by Dave Gullo with 142v9/150 followed by Ray Hanson and Frank Monikowski in second and third respectively. The Long Range Aggregate was awarded to Ray Hanson with 139v6/150, followed by Dave Gullo and Frank Monikowski, positions which were repeated for the North American trophy for the winner of the Grand Aggregate with Ray Hanson's 378v13 being the winning total score. Finally, Dave Gullo presented the prize for highest aggregate score by a newcomer to Joe Boyle of the US.



The short range and long range concurrent team matches over the first two days also were also dominated by Americans. The Loyalist Cup Short Range match was taken by Frank Monikowski, Dave Gullo and Bob Picard with 391v15, followed by Ray Hanson, Robert Englebach and Joe Boyle (374v10) and Ivan Duval, Chris Jones and Davis Hicks (349v12).

The Long Range Ranger Cup team match was won by Hanson, Englebach and Boyle with 380v9, with second taken by Monikowski, Gullo and Picard with 330v8. In third with 294v4 were Canadian newcomers Mark McElrea and Dan Reive, with American Glenn Kaye.

Sunday's cool, wet weather led to the decision on the part of a few competitors to retire from the International Team match between the US and Canada, consisting of three 900m matches. In what seems to have become a foregone conclusion annually the US team trounced the Canadians - 746V22 to 466V4.

Final Thoughts

This years' competition was important in several respects. It implemented new rules intended to emulate those used elsewhere, thereby eliminating a longstanding argument against participation put forward by some parties. Statistics calculation by the office was also a benefit in terms of speed of compiling results and, by posting them electronically, accessibility to all via internet.

Finally, and to my mind most importantly, exactly half of the participants were Canadian. That hasn't happened in several years and implies a marked increase in interest in Long Range Black Powder Target Rifle competition in this country.

While the economy and other extenuating circumstances will continue to influence participation it is comforting to see a continuing increase in attendance and more significantly, a decrease in the age of those involved. We offer a comprehensive program at reasonable cost which is recognized as being one of the best available and will continue to do so.

This year the number of entrants was significantly higher. There were approximately 106 entered in Pistol, 107 in Service Rifle and 70 in Precision/Sniper/DM. I encourage provinces to pry loose some of their service conditions shooters and bring out a team. If they need any assistance in getting one started they have only to give me a call or e-mail and I will assist in any way possible. These matches are not just for military personnel. This is where civilians who are interested in this style of shooting get to compete at a national level. It is also the only place in the world where civilians can shoot these types of matches alongside the military and police agencies. If you are interested, contact the DCRA for details.

Although detailed results are elsewhere in this magazine and are on the DCRA website, a special congratulation goes to MCpl Cal Ryan who won the CF/RCMP Service Rifle event and was chaired off the range for the first time. It was a well deserved win. Also congratulations to Sgt Matt Kirkpatrick who was the service rifle open tyro and MCpl Cary Baker, LFWA, who was top tyro CF/RCMP. We would also congratulate Capt Ken Barling, ATESS, who won the Regular Force Queen's Medal, and MWO Francois Duchesneau, 2CRPG, who won the Reserve Queen's Medal (awarded during CFSAC).

How things went this year with suggestions for next year... Pistol

The pistol matches continue to be the same "Skills Drills" matches as previously. These matches are simple to administer, shot in relays and are easy to conduct. This last point is important with limited volunteer staff. The matches were well received and we are encouraged to continue in this direction.

Because we never know in advance how many shooters there will be and because we are always limited by range staff, we can never predict how many matches can be conducted. To overcome this problem we introduced the "floating aggregate" approach. We have 10 matches outlined in the rule book and proceed through them until it is time to stop. At this point we finish whatever match we have started and then call the day's agg there. This proved to work very well for both days. It proved particularly good for Day 2 which was a Saturday and with the new range rule in place preventing us from starting the matches until 0900, it was completely unknown how far we might get.

All of these matches ran smoothly. We receive many positive comments about doing this style of shooting as it emphasizes marksmanship fundamentals. I believe this is where the DCRA should make its mark with the concept that if you get the basics right, the rest will be easy.

Sniper/Precision Rifle

These matches are well established and have been the same for many years. Operational military snipers have told us they are good ones and if someone can shoot them well, then they are well prepared for actual operations.

This year we added the Designated Marksman (DM) class. This

allows military shooters using their C7 rifles to shoot alongside the snipers. The class was well received and attended with approximately 24 entrants.

Rifle

The rifle matches went very well and received lots of positive feedback. The military competitors spoke favourably about the opportunity to shoot at 400 and 500 meters. They claim, based on their experience in Afghanistan, this is a good skill to have. They liked the format of focusing on marksmanship skills.

Because of the numbers, (approximately 107 entrants) we were unable to do all of the stand-alone matches and cancelled the Moving Targets match, shooting the FIBUA and Falling Plates. Perhaps next year, if we have the same numbers situation we will plan to shoot the Moving Target match and cancel the FIBUA. From an events scheduling point of view, the matches for each of the weapon classes are compartmentalized so there was no overlap between them. This allows competitors to finish one weapon class before moving onto the other. This has worked well and will continue. The senior shooters, who grew up on the current NSCC matches and are now experienced with the new CFSAC course of fire, have all encouraged me to keep NSCC as it is. As one Afghan vet said, "If CFSAC is to reflect what is currently being done on operations; I wonder what that will be in a couple of years?" NSCC provides a foundation onto which can be built any specific operational requirement. If a shooter can do well in NSCC, they can do well at any shooting - this has been shown to be true many times, in many places.

In general, the plan is to have all the matches remain the same with slight adjustments to streamline or enhance. It is hoped that soon the only changes to the rule book from one year to the next will be the date. If anyone has any suggestions, please contact me.

DCRA Service Conditions Hall of Fame...

The DCRA has in place the Service Conditions Hall of Fame. Consideration for entry into the Hall of Fame will depend on a variety of conditions for which the accumulation of points is needed. Details can be obtained from the DCRA.



SIR ARTHUR CURRIE

Every year the Provincial matches are held at Vokes Range in Chilliwack. There is a team match at the 600yd range called the "Currie" match.

So I ask you, who is Currie?
Being somewhat curious as to where the match names come from I did

some investigation

into this matter.....

Sir Arthur Currie (1875-1933) was born at Napperton, Ontario on December 5, 1875. (At birth his last name was spelt Curry). He was educated in the public schools of Strathroy, ON. In 1984 he moved to BC and taught in the public schools of Sidney and Victoria for 5 years. He then became involved with insurance and real estate businesses which he practiced with little success and through which he became heavily indebted.

Curries was best suited to soldering. He joined the 5th Regiment of Canadian Garrison Artillery in 1897 and received his commission in 1900. His rise through the ranks was swift, and in 1909 he was given command of the regiment. His command was one of the most efficient in Canada and Currie's personal reputation was high with the minister of militia in Ottawa.

When war broke out in 1914, Currie was offered the command of the brigade in the 1st Canadian Division. After training in England currie led his troops to France in February of 1915. Very shortly thereafter he and his men faced the first German gas attack at Ypres but stood their ground with incredible fortitude. In September 1915 Curie took charge and led the troops through a series of terrific battles, Mont-Sorel, the Somme, Fresnov and Vimy. (Currie was knighted on the battlefield by King George V.) As a commander, Currie was not a brilliant strategist, but he was an excellent tactician, skillful in the use of artillery, and meticulous in his planning. He was known to be careful of the lives of his troops, something for which WW1 generals were not renowned for. The troops nicknamed him "Guts and Gaiters". He was stern and aloof but trustworthy. Promoted to lieutenant general he led corps through the horror of Passchendaele and through Arras and Amiens. In 1919 he became Canada's first full general.

After WW1 Currie was made general and named the inspector general of the military forces of Canada, a position he held until 1920 when he resigned to become principal and vice chancellor of the McGill University in Montreal. Often mentioned as a possible leader of the Conservative party Currie decided to remain in academic life. He died on November 30, 1933.

Currie was interred in the Mount Royal Cemetery in Montreal, QC. Go to www.currieproject.ca for more information on this amazing man.

Some Tributes and Legacies:

- * 1919 General Currie Elementary School built in Richmond, BC * At the National Field of Honour, a war cemetery in Point-Claire, QC the main roundabout is named Currie Circle, and within it stand The Cross of Remembrance. Currie was President of the Last Post Fund from 1924 to 1932 and now Last Post Officials are buried around the cross in Currie Circle
- * Currie Building and Currie Hall at the Royal Military College of Canada in Kingston, ON were named in his honor. The family coat of Arms are carved into the limestone of the Currie Building * University of Victoria has an on-campus building named Sir Arthur Currie
- * At McGill University, his legacy is the Currie Gymnasium and the Montreal Neurological Institute under Wilder Penfield
- * In the Officer's Mess of the Canadian Scottish Regiment the favourite chair of Sir Arthur Currie is reserved for the Commanding Officer of the Regiment
- * The Currie Barracks in Calgary, which opened in 1933, the year of this death, were named in his honour
- * In 1934, the year after his death, Currie was designated as a National Historic Person of Canada. A plaque for this was commemorated in 1938
- * The street in Victoria where he lived before the Great War was renamed *Arthur Currie Lane*
- * A history room at his old high school, Strathroy District Collegiate Institute, has been named in his honour
- * Robert A. Heinlein, in his science fiction novel, *Starship Troopers*, named a Mobile Infantry basic training facility "Camp Arthur Currie"
- * In 2006, Canada honoured Currie as one of fourteen Canadian heroes at the Valiants Memorial, and he was one of five people remembered with a life-sized statue.

International Teams

World Long Range Championships, Brisbane, Australia 2011

As I write these notes, the 2011 WLRC has just been concluded. I am sure that we will receive a full account from the Team Officers, Bob Pitcairn, Dave Adams and Justin Hearn, but it may not be in time for this issue of the Marksman. Regular reports have been made on the team "blog" by Steve Hunt, http://www.canadianrifletourtobrisbane.blogspot.com/, and full are posted on the **NRAA** web scores site, http://www.2011.nraa.com.au/results.php. The Canadian teams won bronze medals in the Under 25 and Veterans World Championship Team matches. This is the first time, I believe, that Canada has won medals in these events. Congratulations to all! In the titanic struggle of the Palma Match, Great Britain won the gold medals. Canada finished 5th, overtaking New Zealand at the last 1000 yard stage.

Canadian Bisley Team, 2012

The Commandant is Robert Best and the Adjutant Paul Dudzinski. Under the revised procedures for Bisley Team selection, the first stag e of team formation is now over. The Team Officers will continue with the process of selection of TR and F Class shooters. All those who may be interested, both TR and F Class shooters, in being considered for the 2012 Bisley Team are advised to look at the procedures, which have been published in the Marksman and are posted on the International Teams section of the DCRA web site, and to contact the DCRA as quickly as possible. Whilst those in the top 35 of the TR and top 6 of the F Class Canadian Championships, who have not yet accepted their place, are not necessarily excluded, they may be passed over if they do not reply soon.

America Matches for TR and F Class, 2012

The America team matches will be held on Wednesday 15 August, 2012, at Camp Perry, Ohio. Fazal Mohideen and Bruce Condie have been appointed as Captains of the Canadian TR and F Class Teams. They are both now working on team selection and training. Any member interested in being considered for these teams is asked to contact the respective Captain. Current reports indicate that a number of overseas teams, having competed at Perry, will come to Ottawa for the Canadian Championships. It should be an interesting year!

F Class World Championships, Raton, USA, 2013

As published on the US F Class web site, the next F-Class World Championship will be held in Raton, New Mexico, USA. The dates are 23 to 27 August, 2013. Preceding the World Championships, the 2013 US F-Class National Championships will be held from 18 to 22 August, 2013. Most regrettably, the dates chosen by the USA clash directly with the 2013 Canadian Championships. Canadian Team Captain, Bill Flintoft, and his colleagues are working hard on team preparation and selection.

Commonwealth Games 2014, Selection Trials

The next Commonwealth Games will be held in Scotland, in late

July 2014. At this time of writing, the arrangements for the Commonwealth Shooting Federation Championships, which would normally be held at the Games venue in the year prior to the Games, are not known. As soon as I receive any information, I will post it on the DCRA web site. The procedures for the selection of the two fullbore shooters to represent Canada, plus a reserve, have been approved by the Executive Committee. They are posted on the International Teams section of the DCRA web site and have been published in the Canadian Marksman. The first part of the Selection Trial was held at the 2010 Canadian Fullbore Championships. The list of scores is shown in the 2011 results section of the DCRA web site, "#765 The Selection Aggregate". As approved, the top 20 shooters in 2011 are invited to take part in the second part of the Trial in 2012. Those who wish to participate will pay a \$50 registration fee, which will be placed in the DCRA Fund dedicated to the support of our Commonwealth Games endeavours. If some shooters in the top 20 do not wish to remain in the Trial, they will be replaced in order of scores by those lower in the list, on payment of the registration fee. The course of fire in 2012, with scores added to those made in 2011, will be the Canadian Target Rifle Championship, plus a final day of shooting on Sunday 26 August, as detailed in the procedures. Let's Wake Up!

 Γ or the last two decades, we've been lamenting the decline in our membership and in the attendance at the Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championships.

We keep calling the cadets the future of the DCRA but, until now, that hasn't been the case.

Although F Class is thriving in the regions, we can't seem to attract them to our national championships in any significant numbers, at least for the Grand Aggregate.

If you have the talent and take the time to train hard, you have to spend a small fortune to accept a place on the national team and to represent your country I'm not sure how that could be fixed, but we could certainly look into the fundraising ideas that some of the members of the Executive have put forward.

The one drawing card that would help is widespread recognition. We are seriously lacking in that regards. Why are the members of our Hall of Fame not on Wikipedia? Why have we not approached the Canadian Sports Hall of Fame to induct Norm Beckett? Why don't we point out to provincial rifle associations when their members achievement may qualify them for their provincial halls of fame or orders? Why hasn't Jim Paton's name been put forward for the Order of Canada?

We even downplay our achievements within our own ranks. The best example of this is the Canadian Target Rifle Championship which we have insisted in calling the "Winner of the Bisley Aggregate" for so long that half the shooters don't know it exists, including one man who had been Canadian Champion and didn't know it because the plaque he received that year read "Canadian TR "Bisley Agg". The Executive made a decision made a decision last year to ban the expression "Bisley Agg" from our lists, and it should stay that way, even in reference.

When it was suggested that the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate should be called the "Canadian Open Target Rifle Championship" someone thought it may take away something from its prestige? How does that make sense? I'm sure the foundation would be delighted to have it called the "Macdonald Stewart Canadian Open Target Rifle Championship".

This attitude is not recent. I have a copy of a 1955 *Canadian Marksman* with Gil Boa's picture on the cover. The caption says "Gilmour S Boa International Champion". In actual fact, he had won the World Smallbore Shooting Championship in Caracas, in 1954. If one didn't read the article, one might think he had gone to a regional match in the U.S.A.

A more recent example is when Jim Paton won the Commonwealth Fullbore Shooting Championship in Malaysia in 1997. I've heard his win described as "The gold medal at the CSF matches", "came first at the warm-up shoot for the Commonwealth Games" or simply "a shoot in Malaysia".

Another serious problem is our penchant for acronyms. When we went from calling our national matches the "DCRA Annual Prize Meeting" to the "Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championship", to properly identify what it was we were doing, it only took two days for it to become the CFRC (it took me two months to figure out

what they were referring to). To give you a fine example of DCRA jargon, my all time favourite is "DCRA 2009 Cdt/Jr Open TR Championship". I'm not sure the poor kid who won that plaque knows he won a national championship.

People who practice a competitive sport like recognition, and recognition comes with the use of superlatives, not by downplaying everything except the Governor General's Match. For most people, personal satisfaction is not enough to put the effort needed to excel in a sport.


The Canadian Championships including the Under 25, junior, F Class and Canadian TR should be presented with more pomp. We should have a Canadian Ladies Championship and a

a Canadian Open Ladies Championship. A plaque should be given for each of these categories and the lettering should spell out what it is (not Cdn TR). We should do the same thing for Veterans.

Let's stop going out of our way to go unnoticed.

These changes, mostly in attitude, many not be the answer to all our problems, but they would certainly help, and they need to be made now.

People who practice a competitive sport like recognition, and recognition comes with the use of superlatives, not by downplaying everything except the Governor General's Match.



Traditions may be a charming part of our sport but, too often they translate into an unhealthy resistance to change. Some of these traditions are slowly killing us.





An early D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medal Private Orvill Stanton's other 1887 memento

Note: This article originally appeared in the October 2010 Canadian Numismatic Journal, the official publication of the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association.

Private Orvill Stanton, 60th Battalion, Mississquoi, Quebec enjoyed a successful three days at the annual provincial rifle competition in Montreal in the summer of 1887. He went home to Stanbridge East with a Governor General's Silver Medal, \$52.00 in prize money, and this lovely silver D.C.R.A. medal. Although an accomplished competitive shooter for many years, and a member of the 1886 Canadian Wimbledon Team, the 1887 medals were the only ones Private Stanton ever won.

Readers may recall an article on Private Stanton's Governor General Lansdowne Silver Medal that appeared in the Winter/Spring Canadian Marksman. This present article examines the other medal he won at the 1887 competition. It also takes a look at the history and significance of D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals, which are still being awarded today.

Private Stanton's D.C.R.A. Medal

Private Stanton's medal is struck in sterling silver. It weighs 40.7 grams and has a diameter of 44.4 millimetres. It is 4.5 millimetres wide at the exceptionally high rim. The edge is engraved: "Pvte. O. Stanton 60th. Battn."

This D.C.R.A. medal with the "classic design" is often misinterpreted. Since most are not engraved with a name, event, or date, the wording: "Presented by the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association 1868", confuses those unfamiliar with the medal type. The year 1868 refers to the date the association was established, not the year the medal was presented. The first medals of this type were awarded in 1877. Often called the "D.C.R.A. Medal", particularly in early rifle association records, the medal type is now officially known as the D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medal. Since its inception, it has only been provided to rifle associations affiliated with the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, to be used as prizes for annual competitions. It is not a medal that can be won at D.C.R.A. national competitions.

The medal's attractive design, struck in high relief, with sharp details, depicts two military marksmen congratulating one another with a handshake. This design was the original D.C.R.A. crest, which is still in use today, slightly altered. The soldier on the left holds a short rifle, most likely a .577-calibre Snider-Enfield Carbine. The figure on the right holds a long rifle with a fixed bayonet, likely a Government pattern .577-calibre Snider-Enfield. These rifles, provided to Canada by Great Britain in 1866, were the standard across the British Empire for decades. The medal manufacturer's name, Elkington & Co, Regent St., London, is in tiny letters around the rim, below "1868".

The medal came in a small, red box, with gold trim and no markings. The inside bottom is velvet lined, shaped to hold the medal, with a blue ribbon. The inside cover is lined in silk of royal blue.

How he won it

It will be noted that neither the year nor the association event is mentioned in the edge engraving. Researching this medal and its companion (the Governor General Lansdowne Silver Medal mentioned earlier) commenced at D.C.R.A. headquarters in Ottawa. The Report of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association 1887 (Ottawa: Mason & Reynolds, 1888) was helpful in that it indicated both medals were won at the 1887 Province of Quebec Rifle Association (P.Q.R.A.) match held in Montreal. However, this report does not provide details of how, or for which events, the medals were won. Fortunately, the National Library in Ottawa has copies of old P.Q.R.A. reports. Proceedings of the Province of Quebec Rifle Association for 1887 (Montreal: McQueen & Corneil, 1888) provides details of the entire event, which was held at the "old ranges at Pointe St. Charles" on Aug. 9 - 11, 1887. Private Stanton competed as a member of the Active Militia and won the D.C.R.A. Medal as second prize in a category based on competitors' aggregate scores in four separate matches. In order to capture the flavour of the times and demonstrate the remarkable skills required in these competitions, here are the details of how Private Stanton won his D.C.R.A. medal, taken from the 1887 P.Q.R.A. annual report:

2nd match - Association: Open to all members of the P.Q.R.A. Ranges, 500 and 600 yards. Number of shots, 7 at each range. Rifles, Snider, Government pattern. Position, any with head to the target. Entrance, 70 c for individuals. Number of competitors, 145. Private Stanton won first place with a score of 52 points out of a possible 70. The prize was an album and \$25.00

4th Match - Active Militia and Battalion: Open to the Active Militia of the Dominion of Canada, the Staff and Officers who have retired retaining their rank and being members of the P.Q.R.A. Ranges, 200, 500 and 600 yards. Number of shots, 7 at each distance. Rifles, Snider, Government pattern. Position at 200 yards, standing or kneeling, at 500 and 600 yards, any position with head to the target. Entrance, \$1.30. Number of competitors, 133. Private Stanton placed seventh with a score of 77 points out of a possible 105, winning a prize of \$8.00.

5th Match - details missing, but score inferred to be 18 points out of a possible 35.

6th Match - Merchants: Open to all members of the P.Q.R.A. Range 600 yards. Number of shots, 7. Rifle, Martini-Henry. Position, any. Entrance, 65 c. Number of competitors, 140. Private Stanton placed twelfth with a score of 27 points out of a possible 35. His prize was \$5.00.

10th Match - Aggregate, 1st Series - Militia: For the aggregate scores in matches 2, 4, 5 and 6: Private Stanton placed second with a score of 174 points. He missed first place by just three points. The second place finish won him the D.C.R.A. Medal and \$10.00. Had he won first place, he would have received a National Rifle Association (U.K.) medal, a P.Q.R.A. badge, and \$10.00. The first ten men in this match were also entitled to tickets to Ottawa to attend the D.C.R.A. matches and were eligible to shoot for the Provincial Cup.

The medals and other prizes were presented by The Honourable Sir Adolphe P. Caron, K.C.M.G., in the hall of the new Victoria Rifles Armory in Montreal. We can only imagine how proud Private Stanton must have been.

The man and his times

Orvill S. Stanton was born Dec 28, 1848 in Stanbridge East, Mississquoi County, in Quebec's Eastern Townships. He was a farmer, a cabinetmaker, a sportsman, and an avid hunter. He became an expert marksman in later life. As a young man, he would have been caught up in the excitement of the 1870 raid on Eccles Hill by the Fenian Brotherhood. Eccles Hill is a mere seven miles from Stanbridge East. The local Militia, (60th Battalion, Mississquoi), the army, and the "Home Guard" successfully repulsed the Fenians during May 24-25. From what I could learn, however, it does not seem that 21-year-old Orvill was involved in the battle. He may have been away living with relatives in Michigan at the time.

Perhaps because it was the patriotic thing to do or perhaps because of his interest in rifle competitions, he joined the 60th Battalion Militia some time after the Fenian raid, likely in the late 1870s or early 1880s. His name is prominent in local 60th Battalion competition records and those of the P.Q.R.A. and D.C.R.A. through most of the 1880s.

Throughout most of his long life, Stanton remained a bachelor. Shortly before his death at age 89, he married his boyhood sweetheart, after her first husband died. Stanton and his wife are buried in the Anglican Church cemetery in their hometown of Stanbridge East. Their monument bears no mention of Mrs. Stanton's first husband. Was there a long, sad love story here that we will never know?

D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medal then and now

According to its various annual reports covering the 1880s, the D.C.R.A. ordered small quantities (approximately 50) of these medals every year for distribution. Private Stanton's medal was likely from a group ordered in early1887 at a cost of £56 - 5'-0d (equivalent to \$274.38) for the batch. Elkington & Co., the prestigious silversmiths and medallists of London (U.K.), produced

the first batches of D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals. They were all sterling silver. The first strikings had exceedingly sharp details, as indicated by Private Stanton's 1887 medal.

An accurate history of D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals would be difficult to assemble, and is not the object of this article. Although detailed records of who produced D.C.R.A. medals are available for the earlier years (19th century), they become sketchy at best by the middle decades of the 20th century. Quite simply, records to that level of detail are not retained. This was also a time when the quality of D.C.R.A. medals dropped off and eventually sterling silver Affiliation Medals were no longer affordable. Moreover, the practice of engraving medal edges with winners' names was not universal across the various associations that awarded them. It virtually ceased as the years passed. As a result, it is difficult to date many Affiliation Medals unless their provenance is known.

D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals were re-struck as needed over fairly long time spans. Later versions by Ellis in Toronto show progressive die wear, with high points on the medals becoming less and less sharp. Several medals in the National Medal Collection exhibit this effect. Ottawa dealer and medal collector Henry Neale, who has handled numerous D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals, confirms this is the case.

Bronze D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals are often seen for sale and in collections, as well as their silver counterparts. The bronze versions were produced in later years, perhaps commencing in the early 20th century. Various examples of medals show that slightly different dies were used, and thinner bronze medals of lighter weight are known.

It was up to each association as to how to award these medals. Silver medals may have been first prizes or, as in the case of Private Stanton's medal, second prize. The early bronze medals would thus have been either second or third prizes.

As noted earlier, the first D.C.R.A. medals were awarded in 1877. That year, the P.Q.R.A., the Ontario Provincial Rifle Association and the Victoria Rifle Association (Hamilton) each awarded a

silver medal. Thereafter, up to 1887 and beyond, silver Affiliation Medals were awarded by the various provincial and territorial rifle associations, as well as a large number of affiliated military and local rifle associations. In modern times, military affiliation with the D.C.R.A. ended and, for many years, only the provincial rifle associations received and awarded Affiliation Medals.



Today's D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals, although struck in base metal, are beautiful copies of the original design.



Since at least the mid-1970s, D.C.R.A. Affiliation medals have been produced by Pressed Metal Products of Vancouver. These modern medals, all struck in base metal, are a marked improvement over their immediate predecessors. Struck using new dies, they are beautifully executed with sharp details in high relief. The design is a faithful copy of the original medal. 'Bronze", "silver" and "gold" versions are ordered each year as required. According to Alan Trammell of Pressed Metal Products, the "bronze" medal is actually copper, with an "antiqued" finish. The "gold" medal is also struck in copper, and plated in 24-karat gold. The "silver" is struck in brass and silver-plated. (Brass is easier to silver-plate

than copper.) A set of the three medals is sent every year to each provincial rifle association, to be awarded at its annual match. Additional medals may be purchased if an association wishes to award more as prizes. Reviving a tradition of the early days of the D.C.R.A., Affiliation Medals are again, occasionally, given as prizes at D.C.R.A.-sanctioned events other than those held by the provincial associations. In 2009, the Canadian Rangers' rifle match in Nunavut and an "F Class" match in Winnepeg received D.C.R.A. Affiliation Medals.



While today's D.C.R.A. crest has the soldier on the left without a carbine pointed at his comrade, the Affiliation Medal retains the original design.

The modern D.C.R.A. crest no longer has the soldier on the left dangerously pointing his carbine at the soldier on the right. The carbine is gone. D.C.R.A. did not wish its crest to display an image ignoring firearm safety. But, in keeping with tradition, Affiliation Medals carry the original D.C.R.A. crest.

Conclusion

Private Stanton won his medals 124 years ago. This was at a time when Canada was a very young nation, just 20 years old, and the Militia was an important part of our defense. Expert marksmanship was a highly valued skill. I imagine, and I hope, that Orvill Stanton's honours were admired and applauded by his friends and neighbours in Missisquoi County, and by his comrades in the 60th Battalion.

The Missisquoi area has produced many marksmen following in the footsteps of Private Stanton. Two, in particular, come to mind from my youth: Edward (Ted) Wright of rural Dunham and Bob Robinson of Bedford. Both were on Bisley Teams. They taught me about firearm safety and tried to make me into a marksman. In the former, they succeeded. But owning Orvill Stanton's medals as heirlooms is the closest I'll get to a marksmanship medal.

My final year, 1980, of Service Rifle Competition

My Area Commander persuaded me to re-engage for another term even though, at 57, my rank determined that I should retire at 50. Meanwhile a significant change in the designation of RFSAC (Reserve Force Small Arms Competitions) to CFSAC (Canadian Forces Small Arms Competitions) meant that we would be competing against the Regular Force as the annual competitions of both components had been merged.

Before the matches commenced I was appointed as the Militia representative on the Match Committee to resolve issues arising during the competitions. Fortunately there were few as by this time, with input from Militia units across the land, matches were logically assembled, staffed and conducted. On to Connaught ranges, then, for the 1980 CFSAC. We would be facing stiff opposition since the Reg's practiced as part of their military function while we in the Reserves, holding down full time jobs could only practice in our spare time.

Our first achievement was the 300 meter, Snapshooting match for teams of 4. Then in a repeat of the previous year, we swept the Sniper Rifle team matches; 2 and 4 member, mid range, and the total aggregate of all ranges including 900 meters. One of the Sniper matches, shot at 600 meters, involved a head and shoulders figure target which would suddenly appear above the mantlet and move at a quick walking pace, to the left or right, for 3 seconds then disappear. A perfect score was achieved by striking the target on its first exposure. A zero score was recorded if all exposures were missed. At that distance wind effects were, obviously, a major consideration and the direction in which the target would move complicated things further. But that is what the sniper in the field faces and this competition was a fairly realistic situation.

When my relay moved onto the firing point I scoped up and down range getting a good reading of the wind's velocity and angle. A practice, static exposure of the target to show each shooter approximately where his/her target would appear, but not which direction it would take, allowed me to establish an appropriate

'lead' for upwind and downwind. On the command, 'Look out!' we all came into the aim just below the mantlet where the targets had been displayed. As the targets popped up, mine headed to the left.I swung onto my 'lead' and got the shot off in under 2 seconds.

The target spun on its way down indicating a hit; one shot down and a perfect score. Rick Irvine missed with his first shot but drilled with his second. But many competitors never scored a single hit. There was but a handful of first shot hits and not many more second shot hits. Rick and I had just given our 2-member team a big boost.

The 900 meter event involved 2 Figure 11, Charging Man, camouflaged targets .They are 4 feet tall and 17 inches wide, closer to the size of a Pigmy than a man. Mounted side by side and separated by about a foot, they are rather difficult to discern with the naked eye, but the sniper scope allows a clear perspective.

On the practice exposure (2-member team) I said to Rick, "These rifles don't have the grouping capability to hold 17 inches wide at this distance. Just aim between the two targets and hope that none go in between." The targets were exposed for 20 seconds and 4 shots to be got off; a bit of a stretch for a bolt action while keeping an eye on the wind. I got only 2 off, both hits, before the target disappeared. Rick did better with 3 hits. The end result was a clean sweep of all Sniper Rifle team matches by CMA.

Introduction:

Some two years ago Jim Thompson and I were discussing the prospects for the 2011 and 2012 Bisley Teams over a glass of malt. We agreed that with the World Long Range Championships in Australia including Canadian Palma, Veterans and Under 25 teams, most of the top shots were likely to be in Australia and unlikely to be able to afford the time and money to come to Bisley. We expected the major impact on the 2011 team but could see that there might be difficulties raising a 2012 team as well. When nominations for 2011 and 2012 team officers were invited, we had received only one, for Adjutant in 2012. Clearly some drastic action was needed. We agreed that the DCRA Executive Committee should be asked to waive the usual rules for appointing team officers and raising team personnel. Jim proposed putting my name forward to the Executive as 2011 Commandant, but I would only agree if Jim were to be my Adjutant. I detected some reluctance in his acceptance but a little more malt smoothed the course.

As International Teams Chairman Jim made the proposal to the Executive, which was accepted with surprisingly little discussion. He further proposed that the Commandants of the 2011 and 2012 teams should have a free hand in filling the teams if they failed to do so from the top 50 of the Canadian Target Rifle Championship (previously known as the Bisley Aggregate).

Raising the Team:

It was no surprise that, when letters of invitation were sent to the top 50 from the 2010 Canadian Target Rifle Championship, only seven people accepted positions on the team, but 22 did not reply at all. That started a long process of telephone calls and e-mails to contact those who had not replied and for further discussion with a few who had declined, with little progress. Next was a careful

look at the rest of the Canadian TR Championship list, which included a few usually reliable shots who had placed far down the list. Several health problems and one rifle failure had prevented them from finishing. This group yielded two more members. A couple of requests for Pavilion accommodation were received from past team members who had been unable to shoot in the 2010 Championship; they were quickly offered positions on the team. I then started calling experienced shots who had not attended the 2010 Championships. Finally a couple of people who had accepted positions had to drop off and we finished with a team of 13 including the team officers. I was grateful to John Chapman for accepting the position of Head Coach, but I could see little advantage in specifically identifying other coaches, since I knew we would all be both coaching and shooting

Dan Stanoev and Andy Kolenko had declined positions on the team because they could not get to Bisley until the start of the individual TR matches and would be leaving immediately after, but they were willing to help in any capacity while they were there. Finally, in a most gracious gesture, Peter Westlake announced he would come over midway through the Grand Aggregate without a rifle but prepared to assist in any way. All three of these gentlemen were added to the team roster filed with the NRA before the matches started.

Administrative Matters:

Jim Thompson deals with these issues in more detail but I must offer a few comments. We instructed people to make their own travel arrangements and to make their own entries into the individual matches at Bisley. We also decided to try to get along without a team van and to ask people to make their own way to and from the airport. In the event, some rented and shared cars from the airport to Woking station from where they could be picked up

by car or take a taxi to Bisley. The rented cars were sufficient to handle transport of teams to Wales and Yorkshire. The team also shared rental of a golf cart at the range and by taping the scoreboard to the golf cart we were able to move the team scoreboard around the range without the need for the usual van.

We had four shooters plus Jim on the ground at Bisley by the end of June. Six more arrived over the next few days and we are able to field a team of eight for the match against the North London Rifle Club. The remaining three appeared the following week.

A complicating feature was the presence of two Canadian Forces teams in the Pavilion, one regular force and one reserves. They had arrived in late June and were leaving before the main Target Rifle matches started. Jim Thompson did a masterful job of organising room allocations during the overlap period. The small size of our team certainly eased the accommodation problem, but in years when there is a full-size DCRA team, this matter will require very careful planning.

Meals in the pavilion started with lunch on July 7 and finished with breakfast on July 25. During this period people were charged for all meals unless they had signed out in advance, in which case they received a credit of 80%. Those arriving earlier or staying later had to arrange meals with Julia Evans by signing in. Meals were generally excellent with no complaints being received by either Jim or me.

The team rented practice targets on Stickledown the morning before the North London Match and on Century the afternoon before the British Commonwealth RC Team Match. The early-arriving members also shared the cost of a further target rental on Stickledown. Quantities of RUAG and RG ammunition had been left by the previous year's team. The RUAG was in effect purchased by the 2011 team and used in practice and for the RAF Match. The remaining RUAG was returned to the team locker for credit. Some RG was used on the zero range at no charge.

Shooting Events:

BCRC Open Meeting

The four of us who had arrived before the July 1st week-end competed in the British Commonwealth Rifle Club Open Meeting July 2 and 3. Alain Marion was the standout among the Canadians, finishing with 419.58 (ex 425) in the Commonwealth (Grand) Agg, 10th overall and top overseas competitor.

North London Rifle Club

Our first team match was on Friday, July 8, against the North London Rifle Club and Kenya, with teams of eight firing 2+15 at 900 and 1,000 yd. At 900 there was a shortage of markers and we lost communication with the butts before our last two shooters finished. At 1,000 it went a little better, at least everyone finished, and we pro-rated scores for the two from the six who had completed the course of fire. In the end, we came fourth with 1080.67, behind the winning NLRC President's team at 1132.113, Kenya at 1096.85 and the NLRC Chairman's team at 1090.84. Serge Bissonnette was our high man at 144.8. An excellent dinner at the NLRC that evening eased the pain considerably.

Huddersfield Rifle Club

Saturday morning saw six members head for Wales and four of us to the Brockholes Range in Yorkshire. There, after our traditional pint at the Rock, we fired at 200 and 500 yd on electronic targets against the Huddersfield Rifle Club. HRC won the event with 384.43 versus our 382.38, with Jim Paton shrugging off his jet lag with 100.18 to be overall high scorer. As usual we stayed the night at the Durker Roods Hotel in nearby Meltham, where we were

treated to an excellent meal by the HRC.

Altcar

On Sunday morning, July 10, Richard Mallinson led us in the traditional mad dash across Yorkshire, into Lancashire and down to the Altcar Range on the coast north of Liverpool. Here the course of fire was 2+15 at 300 and 600 yards with a delicious lunch break between ranges. Huddersfield RC again emerged triumphant with 592.76, followed by Manchester RC at 587.55, Canada 582.74 with Jim again leading the way at 148.23, Altcar RC 581.76 and Leeds RC 563.43. Our usual Sunday night inn, the Old Vicarage in Holmes Chapel had closed and we stayed at the Bear's Head. Anton and Sally Aspin treated us to another excellent dinner at their home in Little Peover. On Monday we headed back to Bisley after the traditional stop to allow Jim to add another plaid shirt to his wardrobe from the Farm Shop at Chelford.

Welsh Rifle Association

As has been the habit for the last number of years, the team was put up at John and Sue Llewellyn's farm and treated to a barbecue on Saturday night. On Sunday the match proceeded at Rogiet Moor Range, opening with an individual competition at 500 m, won by Peter Redstone, counting out John Chapman, both on 48.3. The team match followed with 2+10 at 500 and 600 m, scheduled around a lunch break on the range. The WRA emerged victorious with 564.36 to Canada's 556.42, Alain being our high scorer at 97.10. That evening the team was treated to an excellent banquet at the Abbey Hotel at Tintern, where the prizes were presented.

British Commonwealth Rifle Club Overseas Teams Match

On Tuesday evening, July 12, eight teams plus a half team from the West Indies fired the BCRC Overseas Teams Match, a Kolapore course of fire starting at about 5:45 PM. The fading light reinforced the old adage for this match that the team that finishes first finishes first. The results saw the BCRC Captain's Team winning with 1189.165, followed by the GB Under 25 "A" 1184.124, the BCRC Vice-captain's Team 1183.161, Jersey 1168.142, the GB Under 25 "B" 1166.137, Kenya "A" 1163.119, Canada 1154.104 with Serge Bissonnette leading the way with a fine 149.17, Kenya "B" 1124.87 and the West Indies 575.35. This was followed by a barbecue at the BCRC clubhouse.

RAF International Match

On July 13 we were off through the usual rush hour traffic to Stoney Castle Range, where 11 teams competed in the RAF International, shooting 1+15 at 500 yd in the morning and 1+15 at 600 yd after lunch. Although our 1145.125 (Scott Murray high at 149.15) was only good enough for fourth overall behind Jersey at 1182.149, Regular Army 1170.125, and Kenya 1149.109, we were well ahead of the RAF White Team at 1140.128 to regain the CanAir Trophy from the RAF after some years. That evening we enjoyed the reception at the RAF Clubhouse a little more than usual.

Barbarians & CURA Matches

We had hoped to revive our annual match against the Cambridge University Rifle Association with a match on their home range, the Barton Road Range at Cambridge. Unfortunately, the red tape proved more than CURA could manage and we could not get the use of the range. The match was held with CURA shooting alongside our regular match against the Barbarians at Bisley on Thursday afternoon, July 14, on Stickledown at 900 and 1000 yd. The Barbarians Match was teams of eight and we nominated four of our eight to shoot against the four from CURA. The wind was

best described by one of our coaches as diabolical, a fishtail from 8 left to 7 right. The Barbarians were more equal to the task, regaining the trophy with 696.37 to our 681.20 with Serge leading at 90.5. The CURA also bested us with 361.26 versus our 345.11, retaining the Lions, which had been carefully preserved during the hiatus in the match. For the prize presentation we retired to the roof balcony of the London & Middlesex.

Individual Matches

Throughout the matches, the weather was generally cold and windy, so cold that for the first time in my memory I saw Ant Ringer, three times Queen's winner, on the range in long pants! The daily sprinkles and showers were interspersed with torrential downpours, so it was almost impossible to get through the matches without getting soaked.

On July 15, the first day of the individual matches, Alain was the only team member to make the scoreboard, placing 15th in the daily aggregate with 147.15.

July 16 was the end of the warm-up matches and the start of the Grand Aggregate. In the Donegall Jim Paton made the list with 50.7 for 36th place. Scores were generally high (75.5 was the last X in on the Daily Telegraph list) and no one else made the scoreboard in any of the other events.

July 17, second day of the Grand, produced one win with Serge taking the Police Rifle with a score of 121.12 and the higher score at 600 yd. Two other team members made the scoreboard: Jim Paton was 7th in the Alexandra at 600 yd with 50.7 and Steven Spinney 49th at 50.5. Jim was also last X in for the Daily Mail at 500 yd with 74.11 and 27th in the Sunday Aggregate with 171.23. On July 18, Roger Mullin made 12th in the Times at 300 yd with 50.8 and Marc Landreville was 57th at 50.6. In the Wimbledon TR at 600 yd, Scott Murray was last X in at 96th with 50.2.

July 19 brought the St. George's First Stage at 300 yd. Alain, Serge, Jim, Steven, Marc, Scott and Roger qualified for the Second Stage, with Alain leading the way at 57th place with 75.11.

The Queen's Prize First Stage was shot at 3, 5, and 600 yd on *July 20*, which also saw the Conan Doyle at 900 yd. Scott at 105.17, Jim at 105.14, Alain at 105.13 and Roger at 104.13 qualified for the Second Stage. Jim's 50.10 got him into a four-way tie for the Conan Doyle and he finished 3rd in the tie shoot. Alain and Scott with 50.7 finished 40th and 64th respectively. In the Athelings Centenary Aggregate, Jim was 7th at 155.24 and Scott 9th on the count-back with the same score.

July 21 brought the Prince of Wales to complete the Grand Aggregate. Jim finished at 689.90 for 40th place, Alain at 686.70 for 97th and Serge at 684.71 for 131st.

The Donaldson Memorial

In the Donaldson Memorial Stage I, consisting of the Duke of Cambridge, Conan Doyle, Lovell and Corporation, Jim was the only team member to place in the top 100, achieving 64th with a 191.22. In the Final on Friday evening, July 22, Jim managed a 74.4 to tie for 30th place.

St. George's

Of our seven shooters in the Second Stage at 600 yd on Thursday evening, only Serge got through to the Final with 150.18 in 36th place. In Saturday morning's 900 yd Final, Serge managed a 74.6 for a total of 149.16 and 24th place.

The Queen's Prize

The Queen's Second Stage at 3, 5, and 600 yd was shot Friday afternoon after the Kolapore. Of the four team members, Scott in

33rd at 149.17 and Jim in 51st at 148.21 made it through to Saturday afternoon's Final at 900 and 1000 yd. The Final was won by Mr. Ed Compton of Sussex with 297.35. Scott managed a 288.26 for 52nd and Jim shot a 283.34 for 80th.

Major Team Matches

Overseas

The Overseas Match at 3, 5, and 600 yd turned into a close battle for first won by Jersey with 1238.155, two points ahead of Guernsey and an equally close battle for third won by Kenya at 1218.126 to Canada's 1216.123. In past years our score could have won the match but Jersey and Guernsey put on an outstanding effort, both averaging 103 ex 105 over 12 shooters.

Kolapore

July 22 brought a sunny day for a change. We started well at 300 yd in the Kolapore, actually leading Great Britain by a point but fell back progressively at 500 and 600 yd to finish a respectable third with 1174.124 behind GB at 1188.176 and Jersey at 1181.146.

In the Under 25 Team Match shot at the same time, the GB Under 25 team scored 883.103 to the 841.74 scored by Canada, represented by the Canadian Cadets.

Mackinnon

The Mackinnon was fired on final Saturday morning on a sunny but cold and windy day. The fishtailing headwind proved very difficult, especially at 1000 yd. Canada finished a distant 7th with 1092.80 to England's 1156.126. The highlight was the use of four of our Cadets on one target, coached by Peter Westlake. Braeden Huget 95.9, Alix Voorthuyzen 95.7, Sasha Montreuil 94.8 and Austin Hines 94.5 were four of our top five scorers in the match.

Social Events:

The Canadian Barbecue was held on the evening of July 14. For a change the weather was quite balmy and most of us ate at tables set up on the veranda. The steaks were done to personal taste and a good time was had by all.

The NRA Overseas Reception was held at the Surrey Rifle Association on Friday evening, July 15. The showers drove most people inside, which made for a crowded but enjoyable evening. The major social event as usual was the Canadian Reception on Sunday evening, July 17. It was unfortunate that the Cadet Team, which usually co-hosts the event, was unable to attend. With their absence, Julia Evans had to find additional help for serving the food. It proved to be a cold, windy evening, which may have reduced the turn-out. There was also a rumour in camp that the Reception was cancelled, apparently in connection with the absence of the Cadets. I am happy to report that both Canadian Defence Liaison Staff and our contact at Canadian Forces Support Unit (Europe) were able to attend. In any event, a good time was had by all.

The Ladies Sherry Party on Queen's I Day was organised by Anne Frost and Marion Thompson, with Julia Evans providing the food. Attendance was about average at 25. But a real surprise was that the Sherry Party actually used both cream and dry sherry after several years when only Pimm's was consumed.

The reception for the Queen's winner took place on Final Saturday night. A large crowd followed the Winner in the Chair to witness the firing of the cannon and consume our punch. After the Queen's Winner, Ed Compton, fired the cannon, Serge fired it for his win in the Police Rifle, Braeden Huget for his win of the Young Riflemen's Aggregate and Alix Voorthuyzen for her win as high overseas cadet in the Athelings Centenary Aggregate.

Such a small group limited our selection of personnel for team events and often left us short-handed for many of the non-shooting duties. I must recognise the valuable assistance of Anne Frost, Marion Thompson, Peter Smith, Kevin Hill and Charles

Brooks during the team matches. Over all we had good co-operation among our small group with everyone pitching in to get the necessary jobs done. I want to thank the members, Serge Bissonnette, John Chapman, Marc Landreville, Alain Marion, Jack McKellar, Roger Mullin, Scott Murray, Jim Paton, Leo Poulin, Peter Redstone and Steven Spinney. Most especially I want to thank my Adjutant, Dr. Jim Thompson, not only for managing the details of running the team and keeping the world informed through the team blog, but for having patience, understanding and a supply of decent malt when it was most needed.

Canadian WLRC Team Wins Two Team Medals at Brisbane

The 2011 Canadian World Long Range Rifle Team has recent-▲ ly returned from Brisbane Australia, after a very successful competition at the National Rifle of Australia (NRAA) Nationals and the ICFRA World Long Range Championship (WLRC). The competition was held at the Belmont Shooting Complex. The Canadian Under 25 team won the ICFRA Bronze medals when they placed third in the WLRC Under 25 Team championships. Not to be outdone, the Canadian Veterans team also won the ICFRA Bronze medals when they placed third in the WLRC Veterans Team championships. In the NRAA Nationals individual matches, our team members won 10 gold, 5 silver and 7 bronze NRAA medals. The ICFRA WILRC individual matches produced 1 gold, 1 silver and 1 bronze ICFRA Medals for Canada. The beginning started on 3 October when the majority of the team members travelled from across Canada with Air Canada to Vancouver and then Air New Zealand via Auckland to Brisbane. We all arrived at the Brisbane airport within a two hour period so we were able to use hired bus transport to Robertson Garden Villas. Unfortunately, two team members were grounded in St. John's due to Hurricane Ophelia (just another day in Canada). They eventually caught up to the team with some very interesting travel stories to relate. The Robertson Gardens had one and two bedroom villas with complete cooking facilities and was our home for the next 19 days. The complex had a large BBQ area and a first class restaurant which the team members used frequently. Each room had been refurbished in the past year to include HD TV's (for watching the world rugby finals) and computer outlets. Our ground transport was in the form of 4 - 12 passenger vans, suitable for 9 passengers and their shooting equipment.

The Duncan range is 47 targets with all distances from 300 to 1000 yards. The range had been completely rebuilt in the past two years with new butts, target frames, and beautiful sculptured mounds complete with water irrigation. The ranges have 14 club houses. We were very fortunate to be invited as honorary members of the Brisbane Rifle Club. This became our home on the range when not shooting. We quickly made new friends with the Brisbane Club members joining them at lunch time and later for cold refreshments after shooting was complete for the day. We had the privilege of having a Koala bear and cub live in the trees around the clubhouse keeping guard over us.



The NRAA Nationals were held prior to the WLRC Matches starting on 9 October. The Nationals consist of the President's Aggregate matches and the National Queen's Prize for a Grand Aggregate of 700 points. A club team match and the Australian team match were also part of the program. We entered multiple teams in the club matches and a team in the Australian match to fine-tune our team's shooting skills in preparation for the up coming WLRC events.

The WLRC Veteran team and Under 25 team match followed immediately after the Queens. The veterans were engaged in a close contest all day. The team was very pleased to capture the Bronze medal in a tightly fought match. This was the first ICFRA veteran's team medals ever won by Canada. The squad consisted of only 12 members as opposed to the 17 permitted under the rules. Everyone had to shoot or coach, as there were no reserves. Many on the squad had multiple duties to perform during the match.



The Under 25 team performed very well throughout the entire match. In every team match they entered they were a force to be reckoned with. In the ICFRA world team match they won the Under 25 ICFRA Bronze medals. This was also a first ICFRA Medal win ever in the Under 25 category for Canada. A quirk in the ICFRA rules allowed more than one Under 25 team entry from each country. Again our under staffed squad of only 6 members (plus their able adjutant Mr. Walters of the Palma squad) showed their metal holding their own against teams with as many as 18 members and multiple teams entered. This type of inequity allowing multiple teams needs to be addressed by the ICFRA governing bodies for future competitions if a truly international competition is to be retained.

The Palma Team match concluded the three weeks of shooting. Our Palma team placed 5th but felt strongly that we had progressed in our team performance from previous years. Not any Canadian who was a part of this event felt that we performed at a level we were capable of. The geographic inequities of our country coupled with the minimal resources available still present serious challenges in this 5 coach and 16 shooter match. The training regime which we had worked with certainly helped our performance but there is still much to be done.

The Palma, Veterans and Under 25 teams were combined into one Canadian WLRC team four years ago for training and administrative purposes. It is a team model which suits our association when distances and costs are high. We ran many regional training sessions using the circle training method to develop team

shooting skills and allow every one to experience target coaching. It was quite apparent that the team members, both shooters and coaches, who worked the hardest in their training programs, were rewarded in Brisbane. The Vet squad and the Under 25 squad had the greatest success from their approach to the training. We need to build on this training commitment as we move forward from here.

The team equipment was second to none. We selected the Berger 155.5 bullet and developed barrels, reamers and loads to have the rifles perform at the world level. It was a very common thread to hear our team members praise the ammunition and barrel performance. It was a credit to the DCRA to support the team equipment and ensure the shooting success that we had. The 7500 team rounds were individually pointed by the late Bill Turner. Bill, although terminally ill managed to complete the task before his passing. It was a pleasure to shoot team ammo that held the v-bull at 1000 yards. We honour Bill for his unselfish contribution to the team performance.

Jim Thompson, Chairman of the International Team Committee and the DCRA office staff, Aaron, Betty Ann, and Kathy were very supportive of our WLRC team. It is not an easy task to successfully move a 42 member team to Australia, house them, provide shooting matches, and then back home without a lot of background support. The three team captains pooled their time to perform numerous administration duties as time was available during shooting hours. Jenni Hauser, wife of team member Mirko Teglasi, was a tireless worker on behalf of our team. Whenever we needed help or something done, she was already on top of the situation and ensured we were "all right" in Brisbane. The team captains cannot thank her enough for her unselfish and faithful assistance to help us. She was the icing on the cake so to speak.



Our WLRC team bonded very well with each other. We enjoyed each others company and all were quick to help a team mate when needed. We cannot forget to thank our van drivers, who tirelessly shepherded the team members assigned to them from the hotel to the range to shopping etc. As the tour went on each van developed a personality. This was a credit to each of those individuals in charge of the four vans. Steve, Tom, Jeff, and Peter, thank you. The team captains have organized many teams and this one is deemed to be the happiest and most successful team that they

have been a part of. The accompanying spouses hosted two BBQ's at pool side. The BBQ's were an important part of keeping us as one family. They always seemed to get the timing right. Thank you all as well.

The official team report and financial statement to the DCRA Executive will be completed and presented at the DCRA Executive meeting in December. Every Canadian WLRC team has the benefit of the experience created by the preceding teams to build on. If we are to continue to be successful then the bar must be raised even further. We must draw a line here and then re engineer our training programs and support for the next level of performance need to be successful at the 2015 WLRC Perry Matches. We had flashes of this desired performance at Brisbane so we know it is within all of us to achieve it.

In closing, all DCRA members have a right to be proud of your team's performance. Since we are a small Association on the world stage we must solicit every DCRA member for your support, with time, talent, and treasure.

BGen Romses' Opening Remarks at AGM 2011

Good morning Ladies and Gentlemen and welcome to our 2011 DCRA Annual General Meeting. I thank all of you for taking the time and making the effort to be here today. Let me start off by saying that your attendance is very important as it serves to ensure that your viewpoints are heard and understood, that our organization is run to achieve the interests of our members, and, lastly, that the interests of our Organization are furthered.

Before I go on with my opening remarks I would ask you all to rise and join with me in a minute of silence as we remember our members, friends, and associates who have passed away during the past year. Ladies and Gentlemen let us remember: Dr. Duane Salloum, LCol (Ret'd) Reginald "Rex" Fendick, Mrs. Jean Dreger-McKeever, Marion Cantlay, Frank Battershill, Harry Axam, Margaret Axam, Harrison Peters, Alex Mullin, Jack Holdstock, Diana Van Duyse, Cas de Roux, Michael Belanger, and Marie-Christine Lariviere... A minute of silence..Thank you. Folks the past year has again flown by but in that time there has been a lot of good shooting, a number of challenges (some large, some small), but also successes due to the hard work of many, and when one looks at matters realistically overall, the DCRA has had another successful year.

On the Bisley front 2010 marked the 150th Anniversary of the National Rifle Association (NRA). I'm happy to report that 600 UK pounds sterling was donated by the DCRA and our Canadian Bisley team in July to the NRA in support of their Clock Tower Restoration Fund and presented by Stan Frost at the NRA Reception. As well, a print of the painting of the Shoe Tree here at Connaught was donated by LCol Bill Molnar and also presented to the NRA. Our 2010 Team was capably led by George Harper as Commandant and Jeff Jenkins as Adjutant (I should mention that unfortunately George is currently undergoing some ill health). Their full 24 person team represented Canada well and it's worthy of note that Jim Paton and Ray Smeltzer placed 11th and 12th respectively in the Grand Aggregate. Looking ahead to this summer our 2011 Bisley Team will be led by Stan Frost as Commandant and Jim Thompson as Adjutant. I'm sure you all ioin me in wishing Stan, Jim, and the Team our very best in their endeavours.

Following Bisley a number of other key competitions took place: **a.** in mid August 2010 the Canadian Blackpowder Championship was won by Dave Gullo U.S.A.;

b. in August 2010 a very successful Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championship was held. I say successful because not only did the competition go well but we had very good international representation, solid Canadian attendance, and in the team matches our Canadian Teams did very well. In Target Rifle (TR) the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate and Governor General were both won by Kent Reeve of the USA. He was the first shooter in years to win both in the same year. The Canadian Target Rifle Championship was won by Roger Romses. The top Canadian Under 25 was Catherine Choquette a cadet from Ottawa. On the TR team front Canada won the Canada Match whilst in the America Match Canada placed a very respectable second. In F Class Open the Governor General's badge was won by Dawie Westhuizer from South Africa and in F Class (F) the Governor General's badge was won by Jeffery Rorer of the USA. Lastly, in

the F Class America Match Canada placed a respectable second; c. in September 2010 at the National Service Conditions Championship the Pistol Aggregate was won by Keith Cunningham, the Precision Rifle Aggregate was also won by Keith Cunningham, the Molnar Trophy (Falling Plate Team Match) was won by Kris Desrocher, Kevin Chou, Will Chou, and Kamran Tabandeh, and the National Service Conditions Aggregate Champion was Richard Poaps; and

d. the Canadian Forces Small Arms Competition was ran by DND in September 2010. This past year it was not outsourced by contract as in the previous two years. Their budgets are also being cut and non outsourcing was designed to achieve dollar savings. The DCRA did, however, provide our office staff to do their statistics and Serge Bissonette and Bill Molnar represented DCRA at their meetings for which DND was very appreciative. Overall, the competition appeared to go very well. I represented the DCRA at the Awards ceremony and I'm happy to report that their appreciation for what support we did provide was well expressed.

e. at the end of September/October the Commonwealth Games took place and the

DCRA and Canada were ably represented by Des Vanplew and Jim Paton as competitors, Sandy Peden as Coach, and Jim Thompson and Keith Bornn as officials. The competition unfortunately, as I understand it, was very chaotic but that is a story in itself which is best left to those who attended to detail. I would say, however, we are most appreciative of Des, Jim, Sandy, Keith, and Jim's efforts on our behalf. Lastly, the Host Nation challenges that arose during the Games (not just in the shooting disciplines) were indicative of the earlier bumps which had major implications on our selection process. With regard to them, I would simply say we as an Association learnt a great deal and will ensure that our selection process for the next Commonwealth Games are modified so that delays by the host nation will not impede on our own selection process.

On the cadet front our Winter Postal Programme was again conducted successfully this year with financial assistance from the Royal Canadian Legion. This was the final year of a \$8000 four-year Legion donation which commenced in 2008. I am happy to say we have staffed a request to the Legion to renew the \$8000 donation and are optimistic that they will approve it.

Many of you will have noted that our letterhead no longer carries the patronage of the Governor General of Canada on it and I would like to give a brief update on this. With the Change of Governor-General in the Fall we staffed a letter to Government House asking the new Governor General to accept continued Patronage of the DCRA. Although Government House have acknowledged receipt of the letter they have not yet been able to deal with it and countless others as their staff position which deals with these requests has been vacant since the Fall period. Hopefully, this will be resolved by them in the near future.

This past winter extensive discussion took place related to whether F Class shooters should be considered full members of the Bisley Team. I was happy to see the Executive accept the recommendation that this should be approved. In this sense we as an organization are evolving but I believe in a practical and positive manner.

As we move into 2011 a key international activity will be sending

a Canadian Team to the World Long Range Championships in Brisbane, Australia in October. We wish Robert Pitcairn, Captain of our Palma Team, David Adams, Captain of our Veterans Team, and Laurie Hearn, Captain of our Under 25 Team and all members of these teams best of luck in their endeavours.

Numerous challenges will also continue to be confronted in the coming year. Some of these include:

- a. the departure of our Executive Vice President, Stan Frost, a man who has served in that capacity since 1996 and is a font of knowledge related to our Association. This is a critical position and you folks will participate in the election of Stan's successor later today. We wish Stan well, extend our appreciation for his outstanding support over the years;
- b. Aaron Dailey will be departing at the end of August as our Secretary-Treasurer and will require replacement;
- c. issues related to use of DND ranges by the DCRA (specifically using Hand loaded ammunition and the quality assurance (certification) of our members. Currently this is only a problem at 17 Wing Winnipeg (St Charles Range) but the issues apply to all DND ranges. A temporary waiver is expected to be approved for the St Charles Range for this year and then a longer term solution worked on and obtained;
- d. continuing to balance our budget. I'm happy to say, as you will hear later in Agenda Item 9, that this is in hand but we will have to monitor carefully as we march into the future;

- e. DCRA governance and by-laws (which now appear on our web-site). These should on an on-going basis be reviewed and tweaked as appropriate. With the selection of a new Executive Vice President this may be an appropriate time to again do so;
- **f.** solicite high profile Canadians to support the DCRA. With this in mind a letter has been forward to Mr. Fred Mannix of Calgary; g. the Bisley Pavilion (more will be heard on this during Stan Frost's Executive Vice President report).

I'm confident that all of us working collaboratively will ensure we make some headway on these challenges.

In closing, let me, on your behalf; acknowledge the continuing support of Mrs. Liliane Stewart and the Macdonald Stewart Foundation who have assisted the DCRA in so many ways over the years and the Royal Canadian Legion for their generous financial support to our Winter Postal Programme.

Lastly, I continue to enjoy the opportunity to be your President and to be a part of the DCRA family. We have a great organization with a wonderful history to continue building our sport upon. We must continue to serve the provincial rifle associations and shooters alike to the best of our ability and work together to do so. To those of you filling leadership positions on committees etc within the DCRA or in a Provincial Rifle Associations my thanks to you for your generosity and commitment. Your efforts over the past year have been tremendously appreciated by all of us.

Ladies and Gentlemen that concludes my opening comments.

Report of the Executive Vice-President - Stan Frost

ll going according to plan this will be my last report to the Amembers as Executive Vice-President. The full Committee met three times since the last AGM, on 28 March, 13 August and 11-12 December, 2010. In addition the Planning and Priorities Committee met 10 December, 2010, and 31 March, 2011, and the Board of Directors of the Canadian Pavilion at Bisley Ltd met 12 August, 10 December, 2010, and 31 March, 2011. E-mail continues to be a primary tool for conducting the business of the Association.

General Romses, our President, continues to be a pillar of strength in our dealings with the Department of National Defence. I had no idea when we invited General Romses to assume this position that we would be calling on him as much as we have, and I am sure he did not anticipate this. However, in the last couple of years our need has been very great and I am most grateful that the General has been able to assist us as much as he has.

The DND range use issue has not been resolved, primarily because DND staff have far more critical matters to deal with at the moment. The way forward is clear but final resolution will take another year. For this year we shall have a temporary fix in place while more permanent arrangements are being developed. As part of the permanent arrangements it now appears virtually certain that the DCRA will have to establish a certification system for shooters and range officials, similar to those being used in the UK and New Zealand. This will require that all civilian shooters wanting to shoot on DND ranges be DCRA members.

Membership

Once again I point out that increasing our membership has to be the vital issue for the DCRA. I was most gratified that Tracy East and the Membership Committee achieved some success in getting former Cadet Bisley Team members to come out to a re-acquaintance shoot and I hope that all Provincial Rifle Associations will

take this model and develop and implement it. Such introductory shoots should be run in every region with a view to getting former Cadet Bisley Team members and other Cadet shots back into the game, as well as attracting other new members who were not exposed to cadet shooting. The main burden for recruitment continues to fall on the Provincial Rifle Associations and clubs because few people are prepared to jump into a sport at the Canadian Championship level run by the DCRA. That said, the DCRA must be prepared to give whatever assistance is needed to recruit new members. All of us must work on this critical matter. To recruit and retain new members, experienced shots must be prepared to put considerable efforts into coaching and assisting the new recruits.

To make my final plea to you, we need new blood on the Council and the Executive Committee. We must put some of our talented and enthusiastic young people to work, replacing some of the tired old men who have been handling your affairs for a very long time. I am delighted that no matter who replaces me in today's election, we shall lower the average age of the Executive.

Finance

Dr. Jim Thompson will be briefing you on our financial position a little later. With a small improvement in the entry in the Canadian Championships and a modest return from supplying statistical support to the Canadian Forces Small Arms Concentration we were able to return a profit for the fiscal year. Black Powder returned to the Canadian Championships in 2010 and turned a small profit.

The Canadian Pavilion at Bisley Limited continues to produce revenue. The retention of an outside bookkeeper, which adds to the operating costs, has improved our insight into Pavilion operations but more effort is required. Following from problems brought to light in the past two years, we had an engineering

assessment of the building done. Roof supports, both interior and under the veranda, are critical and require immediate attention. Since the added weight of the slate tile roof, seems to be aggravating problems, we are considering a new roof. Many window frames are rotting and entire windows require replacement. Dr. Thompson and I met with Mrs. Stewart and Bruce Bolton shortly before Christmas and received her assurance of support in solving the building problems.

Staffing

I am happy to report that the DCRA staff has remained stable through the past year. Mike Corcoran was again brought in to handle the statistics during the matches and did another excellent job.

Shooting

The Shooting Committee reports will have full details of the various committee work, but I shall briefly summarise some of the significant items. The Canadian Rifle Team to Bisley was led by Commandant Major George Harper, Vice-Commandant Fred Nachbaur and Adjutant Jeff Jenkins and acquitted itself well despite not winning any of the major matches.

Attendance at the Canadian Championships improved from 2009, helped by the return of the Great Britain Rifle Team under Jane Messer and the hosting of the America Match. Congratulations are due to Kent Reeve of the USA, winner of both the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate and the Governor-General's Prize, to Roger Romses, winner of the Canadian Target Rifle Championship (Bisley Aggregate), to Gord Ogg, winner of the Canadian F Open Championship, to Darin Stewart, winner of the Canadian F Farquharson Championship, to Jeffrey Rorer of the USA, winner of the Open F Class Championship, and to Catherine Choquette, winner of the Walter M. Stewart Under 25 Prize. The team matches were all closely contested with Canada winning the Canada Match, Great Britain winning the Commonwealth and America Match, and the USA winning the America F Class Match.

The National Service Conditions Championships were held between the TR Championships and the CFSAC. Attendance was down because of the separation from the CFSAC. Our congratulations to Richard Poaps, the National Service Rifle Champion, to Keith Cunningham who won the Service Pistol, 3 Gun and Precision Rifle Championships, to Private Tim Hiscock, winner of the Regular Force Queen's Medal, and to Corporal Dave Ferguson, winner of the Reserve Queen's Medal.

It was gratifying to see the successful return of Black Powder to the Canadian Championships. What many people forget is that Black Powder was the original DCRA shooting discipline. Our congratulations to Dave Gullo of the USA, winner of the Grand Aggregate. Our thanks to Chris Jones for reviving the event and our best wishes to him for another successful championship in 2011.

I am grateful that Bill Flintoft has stepped forward to accept the position of Captain of the Canadian team to the F Class World Championships after we suddenly found ourselves without a Captain. I am also grateful that Bob Raymond has accepted the position of Captain of the Canadian Team for the F Class America Match. I hope these gentlemen can assist in the revival of the F Class Advisory Committee, which is sorely needed to guide this fastest growing part of our fullbore shooting world.

International Confederation of Fullbore Rifle Associations

After the rules fiasco in Australia for the 1988 Palma Match, which saw people rasping an eighth of an inch off the bottom of

the pistol grip, snipping a few millimetres off the outside of a rubber rear-sight eyecup and a dozen other things that were irrelevant for performance, I resolved that we needed to rationalise TR rules internationally. When the opportunity arose in South Africa in 1999 to develop an international organisation to govern fullbore rifle shooting, I leapt at the chance. The result three years later was the formation of ICFRA and for my sins I was appointed President, a title I managed to shed in 2007. ICFRA now has 13 full members and 17 affiliated members with the recent additions of Italy and Israel. Canada is represented on the Council, the Target Rifle, F Class, World Championship, Commonwealth Games, Veterans and Anti-Doping Committees, and the International Rules Review Group. The Constitution was recently reviewed and amended and things are now falling into place for the meetings to be held in Australia during the 2011 World Championships. I only hope that these years of effort will result in less aggravating rule issues for Bob Pitcairn, Dave Adams and Laurie Hearn and their teams in the World Championships.

Legislation

As you are all no doubt aware, we are in the middle of a federal election campaign. The government had extended the amnesty on long-gun registration for yet another year and waived the cost of licensing, but that could easily be reversed should another party form the government after May 2. I urge you to question the candidates in your riding closely and get clear statements of their views on firearms law before you vote. Whatever the outcome and whether or not the amnesty is continued, I would caution you to maintain your licences and registrations in case you meet an overzealous law enforcement officer who could create problems if your paperwork is not in order.

Acknowledgements

On behalf of the Association I thank Mrs.Stewart for her continued support. I also wish to extend my personal thanks to the membership and to the Executive Committee for their support over the past 15 years, to the DCRA office staff, Betty Ann Ferguson, Kathy Corcoran, and Aaron Daley and their many predecessors for their hard work and dedication to the DCRA, and to Col. Senechal and the CRPTC staff for their efficient operation of the ranges and their co-operation.

Closing Note

Last year at this meeting, I offered my resignation from the post of Executive Vice-President effective when you appointed a successor or today, whichever came sooner. It appears that you wanted to wring every available drop of blood from this ailing carcass because you will not appoint a successor until later this afternoon. In retrospect I probably should have stepped down last year because I do not feel the DCRA has been getting full value from my services over the past year. Mind you at my current rate of pay, perhaps you have correctly valued my services. I must congratulate Dr. Jim Thompson for getting out of this job at the right time. In 1995 we received he last of our government grant and ammunition allotment, having previously lost the use of Service Flights, a total value in current dollars approaching \$1 million. I suspect that many expected the DCRA to succumb to this severe blow. I am gratified that we have tsurvived the 15 years and I am hopeful that we can continue to improve our performance and our service to shooting. It has been a challenging and often frustrating job but I am glad that, with the help of many friends, I was able to do it. I wish ever greater success to those who follow in this position.

- <u>ii. Black Powder committee:</u> This report was presented by Mr Chris Jones. It was mentioned that the black powder matches would be held again this year as part of the Canadian Championships. He also highlighted substantial rule changes that will help improve the competitions. (please see attached annex G)
- <u>iii. Canadian Championships (TR/F Class) committee:</u> This report was submitted by Mr Dan Chisholm and read by the Secretary Treasurer (please see attached annex H)

- <u>iv. Winter Programme committee:</u> No report submitted. The Secretary Treasurer mentioned that numbers are once again increasing due to increased funding form the Royal Canadian Legion grant.

Service Rifle Committee: Mr Serge Bissonnette commented on the future NSCC matches highlighting that we will continue to offer our traditional course of fire which has proven successful for many years. Several matches have received updates to reflect changing needs. It was mentioned that there remains to be some difficulty integrating our matches with CFSAC as they continue to rewrite their rulebook each year. He gratefully thanked Mr Keith Cunningham and his supporting range officers.
- <u>vi. Coaching Committee</u>: Mr Serge Bissonnette mentioned that he would like to appoint a new committee head to lead and revitalize this committee.
 - vii. ISSF Committee: No longer a committee.
 - viii. Under 25 Committee: No report submitted.
- <u>ix. Rules Committee:</u> This report was presented by Dr Roger Mullin. He mentioned that the rules committee has not met for the last two years due to the ICFRA trails. He will submit questionnaire at CFRC to get individual input on the new rules. There have been no negative comments over the past two years. The DCRA will have to decide how the rulebook will be amended to reflect the changes to the ICFRA rules. F-Class classifications will also have to be addressed before the rewriting of the rulebook. The black powder rule changes will also be incorporated.

This year in Brisbane several issues will come up including procedures for measuring chambers and bullet dimensions. Australia will have to figure out how they are going handle these issues. Can the chambers be realistically measured in field conditions?

Further the issue of drugs in sport will arise at the next two ICFRA sanctioned events. The DCRA has been using the 'Therapeutic Use' rules forms for several years now. Members should be vigilant about submitting to the drug use requirements as they will be enforced in Brisbane.

- c. Administration Committee: This report was presented by LCol (ret'd) Bill Molnar.
 - i. CPBL: LCol Molnar suggested that most point were covered on Exec VP report (see annex D)
- <u>ii. Property Committee:</u> LCol Molnar reported that the HQ will soon be in need of repairs. The roof may need to soon be replaced that will be the priority for this year. Windows and doors will be the next priority.
 - iii. Marksman remains a strong publication but advertising for the publication remains an issue.
 - ii. Millennium Fund: Nothing significant to report.
 - iii. SFC Liaison Committee: Nothing significant to report.
 - iv. Hall of Fame Committee: Nothing significant to report.
 - v. Membership Committee: Nothing significant to report.
- <u>vi. Legislation Committee:</u> Serge Bissonnette mentioned that we are not identified as a lobby group. For lobbying issues members can use the following organizations NFA (National Firearms Association), CSSA (Canadian shooting Sports Association) are proactive lobby group, Firearms Institute is a new lobby organization. Now is a good time to put views forward for the federal election on firearms regulations.

CBSA remains an organization that we communicate with for international competitions. It is a good idea to make sure that the country you are going to is aware that you are bringing firearms. He noted that the US is not allowing firearms to land in the US in transit, this remains an issue. Under the firearms act the provincial firearms officers have a lot of authority to regulate in their own regions. In ON an QC licences are being issued for competition firearms, but are not issuing licences for collectors. In Ottawa if you are going to have a firearm you must be a member of a club. These rules vary from region to region.

Natural Resources Canada (NRCAN) storage of aggregate powder while there always was a limit NRCAN is reconsidering what this limit will be. Further follow up will be required on this subject.

ITEM 9: Adoption of Financial Statements: Financial particulars were presented by Jim Thompson, the DCRA comptroller. He discussed the balance sheet mentioning that at the time the balance sheet was produced we had not received accounts receivable form the cadets or the military. He also mentioned that the money owing to the committed funds would be repaid once this money from the military and cadets was received.

Mr Pat Vamplew asked about money from the Bisley pavilion fund whether it was paid back from the Bisley pavilion to the DCRA. The comptroller responded that ?15 000 had been paid back as a partial payment. There is still more money to be transferred back to the DCRA which will be paid back in due course. Most of the money generated from the pavilion was put back into the pavilion for repairs and renovations as they have been necessary.

Dr Jim Thompson discussed the arrangements between the DCRA, the Bisley Pavilion Corporation and Stanford Catering. There are discussions presently ongoing about these contracts and how they can be better drawn up to suit both parties. Mr Leo Poulin asked what extend are the renovations that are necessary for Pavilion.

Stan Frost commented that to turn the building into a B&B it would require approximately one million (£1,000,000) pounds. Essential work amounts to approximately (£250,000) to include replacing the roof and the veranda supports. The association has to decide what its priorities for the use of the pavilion are. (please see attached annex I).

Motion G04/11: by Dr Jim Thompson to recommend the financial statements for approval by council the financial statements for FY 2009-2010 ending 31 October 2010 as presented; seconded by Paul Reibin. CARRIED

ITEM 10: Approval of Budget for FY 2010-2011

Dr Thompson mentioned that due to uncertainty in the DND budgets no provision would be made for income from CFSAC and that a provision has been made for staff pay increases. Some savings have been found for the CFRC operations which have produced a slightly larger profit.

Dr Thompson mentioned that it is time for an independent audit of the DCRA books he has made provisions for this in the budgets for the next two years. Also the Bisley team account will not be included in future DCRA accounting. In the future a separate Bisley team account will be set up to allow for separate accounting of the Bisley Team.

Finally, 2011 will be similar to 2010 in budgeting terms 2012 may be a better year due to increased participation of international teams.

Mr Jacques Dugas asked we had an estimate for the DCRA HQ roof. Jim replied that we did not yet have an estimate as the issues with the roof had just been identified. (Budget attached as annex J)

Discussion on DCRA finances:

Scott Murray asked about the terms of reference for the millennium fund and if they were being respected as they were initially laid out.

Jim Thompson replied that the executive has voted that from time to time that the executive could use the money for overseas teams. He believes that the funds are the responsibility of the executive to administer.

Scott Murray asked how this compared to the terms of reference originally laid out for the millennium fund. Mr Murray suggested that the fund is a trust fund and the executive are bound by the terms of the fund. Mr Murray suggested that the DCRA be satisfied that it is able to spend the money in the fund by legal standards before the capital from the fund is spent.

Stan Frost mentioned that CRA had advised that the capital must stay in the account for ten years before the capital can be encroached upon.

Scott Murray suggested that he recalls that the capital was never to be spent and that the donors understood that the capital would never be spent. He also recalled that any withdrawals based on interest and earnings were over and above the rate of inflation. He asked to see where the terms of reference are and what they say.

Gen Romses suggested that this should be examined by the new Exec VP and the Comptroller.

Annual Report FY 2010

This pro forma report is submitted by the Secretary of the DCRA by the authority of the Executive Committee to provide an overview of the programmes, activities and financial status of the DCRA during the fiscal year 2009/2010. It should be read in conjunction with the reports of the Shooting and Administration Committees and reports in the Summer/Autumn 2010 issue of the Canadian Marksman. The Financial Statements for the 2009/2010 fiscal year are provided in the report of the Finance Committee. The 2009/10 DCRA Winter Postal Programme continued to expand this year. Entry forms for this year's programme were posted on the DCRA website. As usual, participation included entries from cadets, juniors and seniors (Open Class). Cadet Team entries were up about 30% to 64 and Cadet individual entries almost doubled at 224. Continuing to use the grant

provided by the Royal Canadian Legion for the 2010/2011 Postal Programme, entry fees for Cadets have been reduced and participation patches have been purchased for competitors. A grant from the legion has again been applied for to help defray costs of the postal program into the future. We hope to continue this in future years with the continued support of the Legion. The Canadian Rifle Team to Bisley 2010 led by Maj (Ret'd) George Harper was successful in many respects. Results are posted on the web site of the National Rifle Association of Great Britain (www.nra.org.uk). The 2010 team again shared accommodations with the Canadian Forces Team. This arrangement may continue again this year and in future years as long as there is minimal conflict with the DCRA requirements for accommodations.

This year Canada participated in the Commonwealth Games in India. Led by Sandy Peden as the team coach, Jim Paton and Des Vamplew competed to represent Canada in fullbore shooting. Canada came 6th in the Pairs and 21st (Paton) and 25th (D. Vamplew) in the Individual. While the shooting venue of the games experienced some difficulty technically with the electronic targets a good experience was had by all.

The DCRA National Service Conditions Championships (NSCC) were held this past year, again prior to the military's CFSAC programme. Because of the separation from CFSAC attendance was down from the previous two years with slightly more than 51 competitors down from 70. The NSCC results appear on the DCRA web site (www.dcra.ca). These matches continue to be a warm up for the CFSAC shooters and an excellent course of fire for civilians interested in this type of shooting. These matches will not be held in conjunction with the CFSAC matches in 2011, but will be held on their own the week prior to the CFSAC matches. The 2010 NSCC Champion (Open) was won by Mr Richard Poaps and the 2010 NSCC Champion (CF) was won by MCpl Kyle Roder. The military will continue to offer their new course of fire for CFSAC that seems to be somewhat complex; we will continue to run the NSCC matches independently and with our traditional course of fire.

The 128th Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championships by all reports were a success. With 231 TR entries and 27 F-Class entries this was a rather average year. National Black Powder Championships were revived in 2010 gaining back some of its popularity with 14 entries. Black Powder will again be held in conjunction with the 2011 CFRC programme. The Canadian 0.223/5.56 Championship and the Long Range Challenge were held in conjunction with the CFRC programme. Mr Kent Reeve from the USA won the Governor General's Prize and the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate. Detailed results of the 128th annual matches are available on the DCRA web site. The new Chief Range officer Bill Kedziora and staff, Pat Quinn and his Smiths Falls target marking crew are all commended for their proficiency and hard work during the matches in 2010. Andrew Campbell took on the job of QM this year with excellent results. The number of cadets and cadet instructors participating in the Canadian Championships remained high, and they proved themselves to be capable representatives of Canada in all the team matches. This was the second year for the shooting programme chairman, Mr Daniel Chisholm. Dan did an excellent job scheduling and squadding the matches.

Service Rifle. We would like to thank the Commanders of CFB Borden, London, Kingston and Connaught for allowing us to use their facilities throughout the year.

We would also like to acknowledge the support given to us by his Excellency the Governor General of Canada, The Government of Canada and Ontario, the Ontario Council of Shooters and Mrs. Lillian Stewart of the Macdonald Stewart Foundation for their generous donations towards the sport of shooting. I would also like to thank the many donors within the ORA membership who generously support our activities and especially to the DCRA for it's continued support throughout the year.

We just finalized our 2011 program and are pleased to announce all our range bookings have been confirmed and experienced few cancellations. Cedar Springs is under construction again this season but will be open again in the fall so we have dates booked for September and October. Winona Range is open again after four years of reconstruction. We are excited to be using the facility again because it used to play an integral part in our especially being program so Toronto/Oakville/Burlington corridor. The most important factor is that we continue to foster good relationships with the staff at all four range facilities we utilize.

Our membership drive techniques continue to improve as we've identified better training and recruiting procedures. We just completed the Toronto Sportsman show last week at the Toronto Metro Convention Centre. We improved the look of the booth again by including a large screen monitor displaying all the disciplines in action. Bob Raymond, who has run the courses for a couple of years now has taken it to the next level with improved power point presentations and audio visual presentations. There are over 100 students going through the program each year now. It must be working because our membership retention levels keep going up so they're coming back, they're liking what we're offering. Bob also runs four sold old winter courses at Burlington Rifle Club for new shooters dedicated to hand loading, equipment and shooting techniques. The course also includes two additional outdoor dates early in the year that students are able to apply the classroom work on the mound shooting both as individuals and in team situations. It's working well.

Bob has also revamped our website this winter. It just went live on Monday after numerous tests. The new sight will be more new shooter friendly as members will be able to enter matches on line, check weekly schedules and notices much easier and it will be more interactive with a secure sight that offers training video's for loading, wind reading and discipline education along with match results. We also invested in new equipment this past year. Twelve radio's and thirty helmets for the butts were purchased so that each discipline can work more independently.

I've already received a call from the 48th Highlanders who have received funding to put a rifle team together and requested assistance and guidance for CFSAC training. We are anticipating a larger CF entry in matches this year.

On the Cadet front, like the DCRA we just completed a successful five year contract extension with Major Barrette and the Connaught Cadet camp in-order that they can attend the Provincial Championships. We also hosted an ex-cadet shoot the week after the DCRA Championships last August and it was a great success. Tracy East did a great job in organizing the event, which had a good turn out of volunteers to run the day. It was well attended by a host of old faces, many who have not forgotten how to ride the bicycle. There were some pretty good scores fired on that day. NATIONAL CAPITAL REGION RIFLE ASSOCIATION

NCRRA membership for 2010 was 224. We are continuing our policy of a lower priced first time new member category. The system is attractive to quite a few people and quite a few stay on the following year. In 2009 we had 51 new members and 36 of them rejoined in 2010. In 2010 we recruited 118 new members while losing only 15 of the 2009 recruits and ended the year with a total of 313 members. Some of the new shooters were seen at matches during the year. The military class was reactivated last year. The main purpose was training with historical and modern military arms, shooting clinics and matches. Unfortunately, the Military class Director did not have enough availability to realize the class activities. However, the Military class will remain open this year and we are planning other activities.

There were many matches last year. New activities were added during Invitation Valcartier to stimulate the membership. These activities were not a fast success showing that recruiting new membership takes time and it is a slow process. However, the membership was raise by nearly 25% (21 new members in 2010) showing some interest in long range shooting. It is now important to analyze the characteristics of our new members so we can offer activities that will fill their general interest. A brief analysis of the shooting situation at Valcartier shows a decrease in TR shooting but increase interest over the FF and FO Classes.

The involvement at matches was similar to the past years event with higher membership. New excellent shooters are discovered and they are the new relieving in our sport.

Unfortunately, the military's unit participation was none except for a few military personnel who came on an individual basis. The phenomena can be explained by the shooting schedule but also by the operational tempo. It is hopefully that with the end of the combat missions in Afghanistan more units will join the PQRA's activities.

Two shooting ranges will be update this year with electronic targets. It is now time to think what will happen with other ranges across the country with the new coming electric shooting facilities.

ROYAL NEW BRUNSWICK RIFLE ASSOCIATION

Shooting Range Issue:

During the year the use of Hard Targets on the shooting ranges in New Brunswick became a major issue. Many shooting clubs throughout the province employ Hard Targets on their ranges for a variety of shooting events. Hard Targets are utilized by both rifle and pistol disciplines at various distances and configurations. All action shooting disciplines utilize Hard Targets in their shooting events including a fast growing popular event known as Cowboy Action shooting.

The use of Hard Targets on the shooting ranges of New Brunswick was brought before the New Brunswick Firearm Advisory Committee for recommendation to the Minister of Public Safety. You may recall that in past reports I have explained the New Brunswick Firearms Advisory Committee is a committee established by the provincial Minister of Public Safety to advise the Minister on firearm matters in New Brunswick.

The Firearms Advisory Committee has had a few spirited meetings on this issue of Hard Targets on the shooting ranges of New Brunswick. There are advocates for the complete prohibition of Hard Targets, which would have the impact of eliminating action shooting in the province. The majority opinion considers that Hard Targets can be safely utilized through the development of safety standards relative to the usage of Hard Targets. The issue is still under study by the Firearms Advisory Committee. I expect that if Hard Targets use has become such an issue on New Brunswick shooting ranges that it will become an issue on the ranges of other jurisdictions across the country.

Shooting Season:

The shooting ranges of New Brunswick hosted an active schedule of shooting events during the 2010 season. Action shooting events had a busy season as usual. Small bore rifle has a small presence and is supported well by our Full Bore shooters. We are encouraging the growth of Small Bore through the development of a Modified Target Rifle class, similar to our MTR Full Bore class. The most activity within our Small Bore shooters is with the Bench Rest discipline, which is active. Our Full Bore section once again had an active and successful season.

Air Gun:

RNBRA is encouraging our established shooting clubs to place a top priority on the development of Youth Shooting activities. The profile of the membership of most of our established shooting clubs is largely male and older. Placing a priority on Youth shooting development will change that profile to include young female and male shooters. We have had early success with a few shooting clubs shifting their focus to Youth shooting activities, through the Air Gun events.

The Air Gun events can be shot almost anywhere, so range establishment is not a problem. The senior shooters are enthusiased by sharing with the youth their years of target shooting knowledge. The youth are excited by learning from knowledgeable target shooters. The local communities of these clubs who have developed opportunities for youth have supported the shooting clubs where previously the communities were not supportive of the shooting clubs. So it has been a win for everybody. Through 2011 RNBRA will be working to expand the number of clubs willing to place priority on the development of youth shooting opportunities.

Canada Games:

New Brunswick sent a team of young air rifle shooters to the recent Canada Games in Halifax. These young shooters were new to target shooting as members of clubs that had begun emphasizing opportunities for young target shooters. These young shooters had less than two years involved in target shooting, and they produced a 4th and a 5th place finish in the Canada Games. Following the Canada Games experience the young shooters have stated their desire to continue their involvement in target shooting.

Leadership:

Identifying competent leadership for our association continues to be a challenge. Our well experienced knowledgeable long time target shooters appear to be burned out as volunteers. Consequently association officers are having to remain in positions for multiple year terms. Perhaps as youth are infused into the association new energy will evolve for administrative positions.

Upcoming Season:

This past winter dropped an abundance of snow on our province reducing the shooting activity on many of our outdoor ranges. However Spring has approached with warm temperatures and the abundant snow is receding quickly. Many of our outdoor ranges are accessible and shooting activity has begun. We look forward to another active shooting season on the ranges of our province.

NOVA SCOTIA RIFLE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE

The year 2009-2010 was the seventh year of the Association's new business model that will sustain and support core activities for both the immediate and long term. This new business model places the burden of ongoing funding requirements on the shoulders of the members, and abandons the concept of survival based on the generosity of others. The most drastic change was the application of an 'equity surcharge' to all senior memberships. This amounts to two hundred dollars per senior member for four years in addition to the regular membership fee. After a member's full equity contribution is made, that member's membership fee will revert to the standard amount.

The year 2011 marks the 150th Anniversary of organized Target Rifle shooting in Nova Scotia. To mark the occasion our 137th Annual Prize Meet will be held over four days rather than the normal three. As the Great Britain Rifle Team will be attending the Prize Meet an additional 'shoulder to shoulder' team match will be included in the schedule.

FULLBORE TARGET RIFLE

If not for the availability of our Bull Meadow 'A' range, range closures and restrictions would have severely impacted our Fullbore Target Rifle program. The Debert Range was open off and on during the year but has a maximum distance of 600 yards. The Bedford Range requires the posting of 'sentries' on trails and potential public access points. In addition, the 500 and 600 yard firing point remained restricted to two lanes, effectively reducing the maximum range to 400 yards. As it was not practical to conduct practices and matches on these ranges all Fullbore Target Rifle activities were held at our 800 meter Bull Meadow facility. TR matches held at Bull Meadow included the Kennedy, the Inter-Maritime Trials, the Victoria Day Match, the Canada Day Match,

the Purdy, the Sierra ISSF Match along with the 136th Annual Prize Meet and the Irish Cup match. All TR matches were well attended as a result of extensive promoting of 'F' Class which resulted in an increased number of entries. 'F' Class competitors competed for their own series of medals but were not eligible to win historic trophies traditionally competed for by Fullbore Target Rifle competitors.

HUNTING / OPEN RIFLE

The 2010 outdoor season was reasonably successful. Activities were scheduled on a regular basis at our Bull Meadow facility. This Section has proven to be an effective vehicle to attract new shooters into the Association. Once new members joined our Association and participated in organized 'open' practices, they were encouraged to try their hand at the competitive disciplines. This method has proven to be effective.

SMALLBORE

The Provincial Indoor Championships were held in Stellarton in April at the Pictou County Military Rifle Association range. There was a good turnout for these matches compared to previous years. The Provincial Outdoor Championships were held at Bull Meadow in May. 'F' Class Smallbore was introduced at the Outdoor Championships and attracted a few new competitors.

SERVICE ARMS

All Service Rifle and Precision Rifle matches were held at the Bull Meadow Range. In total there were five standard Service Rifle matches and five Precision Rifle matches. The Section has active and enthusiastic participation and cooperates successfully with local Canadian Forces units. Four NSRA members competed in the 2010 CFSAC. Three of the top four places in the Reserve category were won by NSRA members. The Reserve Forces Queens Medal was won by NSRA member David Ferguson who was also top shot in the competition.

HANDGUN

All NSRA weekly matches were conducted at the Associations Bull Meadow range facility. Four major competitions were held. These were the 'McDonald's Challenge', the 'Bob Sirtonski Memorial Match', the 'Aubrey Gammel Memorial Match' and the Nova Scotia Provincial Handgun Championships. The Provincial Championships attracted a record thirty-eight competitors.

CADET/DND ACTIVITIES

In 2010 we were not requested to provide any support for the Canadian Cadet Marksmanship matches.

The Association was not contracted in 2010 to staff and manage the Land Force Area Atlantic Service Rifle and Service Pistol competition held at Aldershot as we had been in 2007 and 2008.

PROMOTION and MEMBERSHIP

In 2010 the Association continued to promote its activities by operating its telephone based information service, its website and publishing our 'On Target' newsletter.

NSRA membership showed a slight increase in 2009-2010 from the previous year. For the year ending October 31st, 2010 our membership increased by 6 to 106 individuals from its 2009 level of 100 annual members. An encouraging fact is that these numbers included seventeen new Senior members.

RANGE DEVELOPMENT

With 2005 marking the completion of the key elements of our Bull Meadow Range Complex, our 2010 focus was on enhancements and maintenance projects such as a hardened firing line on the 50 meter range and road and parking upgrades. We now have operational a twenty position 50 meter handgun-smallbore rifle 'B'

range, a ten position 100 meter general purpose 'C' range and a three station modified trap 'D' range for shotgun along with the 'jewel' of the complex, the 800 meter 'A' gallery range with seven position firing lines at 100, 200, 300, 400 500, 600, 700 and 800 meters.

The completion of 'A' Range allows us to fully support Target and Service Rifle activities which are viewed as the core sections of the Association, with traditions reaching back to our founding in 1861.

Fundraising and work is ongoing to provide for esthetic and operational enhancements.

GENERAL

For the year 2009-2010 NSRA obtained its liability insurance from the National Firearms Association.

The Association continued a 'partial con-joint DCRA membership policy' in 2010. While the policy does not make all NSRA members DCRA members, it provides for Associate DCRA membership, at no additional cost, for those NSRA members who compete in national Fullbore Target Rifle and Service Arms events. The purpose of this policy is to strengthen the relationship with the National organization while providing a service to those marksmen whose competitive shooting disciplines are effectively governed or organized by the DCRA.



DCRA Long Range Loyalist Cup Black Powder Aggregate winner Ted Girodat died in Kitchener late last year. Ted competed in the Black Powder matches at Connaught in the 1970's and 80's, winning many gold, silver and bronze medals and the DCRA Loyalist Cup in 1978.

A lifelong hunter, from grizzlies in BC to antelope in Wyoming to caribou in Newfoundland and snow geese on James Bay, Ted was also a truly gifted world class gunmaker. His meticuloulsly hand-crafted work was featured by specific invitation in an internationally acclaimed fine firearm exhibition hosted by the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa in the mid 1990's. Ted's work, an exquisite left hand flintlock rifle, was proudly displayed alongside select pieces from Her Majesty the Queen, Messrs Holland & Holland, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York and other world renowned collections. Gifted craftsmen of Ted's calibre rarely appear, and those of us fortunate enough to have known him will mis him deeply. 











