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THE DIRECTOR'S CORNER

W.A. Plouffe Executive Director



As I start this introduction to the 2006 fall edition of the Canadian Marksman, I note that this was my sixth CFRC in the chair as your executive director. Time has flown by and now with this summer's competitions completed it is time to go into full gear - planning next year's big one.

Once everybody leaves Connaught after the matches and the office door isn't opening every few minutes there is a time for a quick breathe, but not for long. I think there is as much, if not more, work right afterwards as before. The office staff is caught up in results, medals, invoices, reports, and general cleaning up of the files and the office, as well as the time consuming task of putting this edition together. There is a need however to start looking ahead as the fall executive meeting arrives quite rapidly and that means some crystal ball gazing to establish the next two year budget and more problematically the following three year forecast. This year we will add to the tasks with detailed planning for the 2007 World Long Range Championship.

Before I talk more about the future I would like to look back on the last six months and share a few thoughts with you. Our Annual General Meeting was the highlight of the early spring activities. Thirty four members, representing most provinces gathered at Connaught for the DCRA/PRA workshop and the Annual General, Council and Executive Meetings. In addition to the important business of voting in the Council and executive governing bodies, the other main item of business was the presentation of the budget, out to the end of the 2006/07 fiscal year. Projections for another three years were provided to see what direction we think we might be going in. The Comptroller was pleased to advise that the 2004/05 fiscal year ended with a net surplus of over \$14,000. Unfortunately the situation post-2007 is uncertain in our eyes, with lower CFRC attendance anticipated, and it has become apparent that when we take a look at the budget deliberations in November of this year that how we do business in the future will need to be looked at. You may recall that I touched on this subject in the last edition. What we do know is that members will need to step forward to assume leadership roles by 2008 as those that have been at the helm for many years have expressed a desire to look forward to a bit of a rest and other roles.

At the April meeting the DCRA/PRA workshop examined three questions centered, once again, on the question of membership. Ric Melling first provided a thought provoking briefing on the subject and then three syndicates were formed to discuss the assigned questions. A brief report on this syndicate discussion can be found on page 6 of this edition.

The Executive meetings in April and August 2006 primarily focused on the short term and this past summer's competitions. The one major shift in procedure that was adopted was how safety and rules are enforced. It was decided to place more responsibility on the competitor and that the Programme and Executive Directors should develop a compliance system based on:

- a) A self help firearm weighing station available prior to the competition.
- b) The provision of a safety compliance signed statement as a part of the registration process.
- c) A series of pre-selected random checks on the range during the competition.
- d) The provision of an identifying badge or other item for scrutinizers and executive committee members.
- e) Random trigger weight testing on the ranges by range staff.

One step we took as soon as the weather was warm enough was to get our DCRA office building ready for the summer. We obtained the services of a painter at a reasonable price who repainted the interior and the entrance porch. The only touch up required next spring should be an exterior pressure wash and some repair and paint work on the second floor balcony. With this sprucing up and the new landscaping, the place is looking good and we wait to greet our 2007 guests.

The summer competitions began in July with the National Service Conditions Championship. Once again, operational priorities prevented the conduct of the military's Canadian Forces Small Arms Competition. And, once again, The DCRA took successful steps to keep this shooting discipline alive at the national level. Although there were constraints on military participation, I am most pleased to report a good turnout by both Regular and Reserve Force members. It became quite clear that there is a strong desire to compete by Navy and Air Force marksmen at this level. I was also pleased to see a large number of Tyro shooters at the competition, who want to improve their skills and return for future competition. You will find a report on the championship on page 5 and the results on page 13. As I leave this subject I do wish to publicly congratulate MWO Michael Gray of Halifax on winning the Queen's Medal, for the Reserve Force/RCMP, for the fifth time. Well done!

After a short break, at least it felt quite short, individuals and teams started to arrive at Connaught for CFRC, The America Match and the F Class Tournament. The weather gods were generally good to us and only twice did Jim Thompson pour over the computer screen to watch Environment Canada's radar forecast for the local area. As we found out it is quite an accurate way of

predicting when the rain will end. Again the results and report from Jim Thompson are found elsewhere in this edition and you are invited to read them.

The America Match was a hotly contested competition and in the end we awarded first place to the team from Great Britain. The USA overtook Canada at the final range to finish second. Colonel Steven Czepiga, US Army Attache to Canada, was our guest of honour and presented the prizes. Following the awards, we repaired to the Connaught Bar, for snacks and drinks - the latter generously donated by the GB Team in celebration of their very impressive victory.

The (first annual) F Class Tournament was a definite success and with teams coming from Germany, Great Britain, The United States and the Republic of Ireland it was indeed an international event that F Class shooters unanimously said they want to see DCRA host again. The prize day presentations were made by DCRA Life Governors Colin Brown and Stan Frost. The new medals seemed to be very well received, as were the two trophies presented by Paul Reibin and the gift certificates from Sinclair International. After prize giving we repaired to the bar for much needed refreshment. This was a successful event, conducted in a warm and friendly, yet competitive, spirit.

We had four occasions to gather socially during the matches. One was the traditional Meet and Great steak BBQ for CFRC and this year we gathered again for another BBQ, this time chicken, for the F Class Tournament. During CFRC the visiting teams hosted an excellent reception at the newly renovated and furnished Connaught Range staff mess. We thank them for their hospitality and all agreed that the freshly mixed Pimms served on the porch was a nice touch and very good.

This year we were most pleased to have our host, Mrs. Stewart, with us for her annual dinner at the Chateau Laurier. Mrs Stewart's presence made the evening complete as she presented the Under 25 bursary prize to Roger Romses and the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate prizes to David Luckman of Great Britain. Mrs Stewart spoke to the guests and despite saying that she wasn't supposed to linger too long was seen talking to members long after dinner was complete. On behalf of all members we thank her for her ongoing hospitality in hosting this splendid dinner in a wonderful historic setting.

And now, as we approach the fall meeting, it is time to focus on next summer. Your World Long Range Championship working group has met several times and now we are into the final detailed planning stages. The Camp Commandant, Colonel J.P. Cyr, is aware of what is needed in the way of ranges, accommodation and other support such as secure storage facilities. He has promised to support us to the very best that his resources allow. We are, as we go to press, waiting for the Public Works contractors to start working on a number of down-range projects and we will be meeting soon to map out the accommodation plan for the ten or eleven national contingents that will assemble here next August.

As I have explained before in these pages, there is a role for all of our members in this 2007 project. We need volunteers - lots of volunteers - to look after visiting teams, VIP visitors and the press. We also need register keepers for the Palma Match and people to work on social and other aspects of the gathering. Watch the web site for further details on this and be ready, please, to make some of your time available to assist and be part of this grand event.

In closing, I remind you of two items. The first is the Postal Programme. Details of the forthcoming year's programme, now available in both official languages thanks to Jacques Dugas, have been mailed out to cadet organizations and PRAs. I encourage you to participate and to encourage local cadet corps and clubs to do so also. The rules will be posted on our web site. The second item is to remind you to read the agenda for the April 2007 Annual General Meeting and to book a reservation for it. The reply form is at page 6 of this edition.

As I let the keyboard cool down from rapid and errant typing, I remind you that I do send out periodic Situation Reports (SITREP) about what is going on here at the head shed and I do ask the PRAs to pass the information on. I will start posting them under Latest News on the website so you may follow them there also.

I wish you a great fall, holiday season and an early spring until I fill in the front pages of the spring edition.



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2006 NATIONAL SERVICE CONDITIONS CHAMPIONSHIP

As your Executive Director I am pleased to report that we successfully conducted the annual National Service Conditions Championship (NSCC) between 14 and 19 July 2006 with a total of 107 competitors. This is a welcomed increase from last year. There were 71 entries in Service Rifle, 28 in Precision/Sniper Rifle, 48 in Service Pistol and 42 in the Practical Pistol matches. There were additionally 81 team entries in various two, four and ten person team matches. We were pleased to register 40 rifle and 23 pistol Tyro entries; this clearly indicates a continuing and growing desire for participation in this competition.

The competitor field consisted of 31 Regular Force, 43 Reserve Force, 2 RCMP and 31 civilians/civil police. The Canadian Forces teams came from MARLANT, National Capital Region Navy Combat Shooting Team, 3rd Battalion The Royal Canadian Regiment, Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada, 15 Service Battalion, 30 Field Regiment Royal Canadian Artillery, National Defence Headquarters Rifle Association, ATESS Trenton, and 400 Tactical Helicopter Squadron. DCRA civilian members, police, RCMP and a Bruce Nuclear Response team rounded out the field. This year the Navy and Air Force, in particular, once again showed their commitment to this sport and a definite desire to be part of the competition with enthusiastic and very competitive teams.

The Canadian Service Rifle Champion and Queen's Medal (Reserves) recipient is a five-time winner, MWO Michael Gray, of the Princess Louise Fusiliers who competed as a member of the MARLANT team. The Regular Force winner was Sgt. Carlos Arevelo of 3RCR, who was presented with a DCRA gold medal in the absence of the Queen's Medal (Regular Force). The results of our matches with scores are posted on our web site at www.dcra.ca.

We were most pleased to have officers from the three environmental staffs at our prize ceremony. LGen Leslie, Chief of the Land Staff, BGen Leversedge of the Air Staff and Capt (N) Bertrand of the Maritime Staff were joined by LGen (Ret'd) Belzile, Assistant Commissioner LaFosse of the RCMP; LCol (Ret'd) Molnar; Col Cyr the Connaught Range Commandant and Mr. Guthrie Wood as guests of honour at the prize ceremony held on the porch of the DCRA office.

None of this could have happened without the direction of the Service Conditions Chairman, Keith Cunningham and the volunteer range officers, Keith and Tim Kagetsu for Service and Precision Rifle, Sgt Bruce Medcalf for Service Pistol and Jason Walker for Practical Pistol as well as numerous other assistants, a lot of volunteer logistic support and the office staff support.



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

Nominations for DCRA Council

In this issue of the Marksman, you will find the call for nominations for the DCRA Council. In addition to positions filled by appointees from the Provincial Rifle Associations, ten places at large are available for full members of the DCRA, with those elected serving a two-year term. If there are more than ten nominations, an election will be held by mail. Council members whose term is expiring are eligible for re-nomination and re-election.

The Nominating Committee strongly encourages all those with an interest in the affairs of the DCRA to consider making nominations and/or standing for Council. It is through the Council that the members can influence the policy and direct the future course of the Association.

It is also from the Council that the members of the Executive Committee will be drawn. The By-Laws require that voting members of the Executive must be members of Council. This adds additional importance to the nominations about to be made. We urge members to take a serious interest in the nomination process. Those with dedication and commitment to the DCRA are warmly encouraged to offer their names for election. Only full (not Associate) members of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association are eligible for nomination and election to Council.

MEMBERSHIP AND RETENTION PRESENTATION

At the annual DCRA/PRA Workshop Mr. Ric Melling presented a briefing on the strategy for making the sport accessible and achievable for new members. He presented a series of slides and engaged the members present in a dialogue on the subject. A short summary is provided:

- The market for new members includes gun owners, family members, foreigners, hunters and youth. The effort required to recruit increases from the first to last in the series of categories.
- * For youth there are three hurdles to overcome: cost, transportation and other attractions of teenage life.
- Visibility of the sport is essential and advertising, although expensive, is required.
- A scheduled training plan for new members is essential. They can't be asked to just come out and shot; they must receive instruction and encouragement.
- * It is estimated that the cost of attracting one new member is about \$50.00.
- * The DCRA cannot sell memberships; only the PRAs can do that.

They have been doing this for us for several years and it has eased a burden that would otherwise be felt by the competitors. Thank you Colt Canada, we appreciate your support.

Our appreciation list has grown to include one I have only hoped for in the past. Mike Apostoliuk of Marstar Canada Inc provided us with a rifle and a pistol that we could give away as prizes. After much discussion on the e-mail list, we decided to issue everyone who entered a firearms class with a ticket towards a draw. Those who won matches received extra tickets. The draw was made at the presentations. Terry Perkins won the rifle and PO1 Marc Bernard - NCR Navy Combat Shooting Team won the pistol.

And finally, I wish to extend my appreciation to all the competitors who gave the extra effort by volunteering for work parties to make sure all of the many little details were accomplished. It is as a result of this willingness to help that we can have these matches.



The E-Mail List...

I have for the past several years been using an e-mail list to contact Provincial Reps, members of the military, range staff and other competitors. I have always received excellent feedback and ideas about the points being raised. I thank you all for your opinions and encourage you keep replying.

The Challenges for this year...

As per last year, the challenges for this year were few and mostly had to do with keeping the cost of the matches under control. To that end, we again did not hire any support staff or vehicles. All range staff were volunteers, with minor considerations for match fees and rations and quarters. The vehicles needed to transport targetry and other administrative requirements were provided by range control, range staff or competitors.

There is the ongoing challenge to get the military units to attend. It is understandable that higher priorities do exist with the conflict in Afghanistan. But I think a young Reservist who is currently serving in "the sand box", summed up the value of the training that goes into supporting a unit rifle team. He sent an e-mail back to his Rifle Team Captain and among other things that can not be mentioned here for security reasons said the following: "That stuff you taught us on the rifle team works. Thanks."

The Queen's Medal for the Reserve Force and RCMP was again acquired and presented to the champion rifle shot.

Attendance and results...

Attendance was up from the previous year with a total of 189 individual entries in the service rifle, sniper rifle, service pistol and practical pistol events. In 2005 there were 155. We are certainly hoping this is an indication of a renewed interest.

Some Changes - Current and Up-Coming...

The DCRA has just recently put into place the Service Conditions Hall of Fame. Consideration for entry into the Hall of Fame will depend on a variety of conditions for which the accumulation of points are needed. Details can be obtained from the DCRA.

So what is happening for next year...

The CF is planning to run a CFSAC for 2007. Capt Steve Tibbetts has been working hard to keep CFSAC from being forgotten. It continues to be our plan to have CFSAC and NSCC work together so that military competitors can compete in both courses of fire. Although there is a lot of planning to do yet, the overview is that NSCC would run immediately prior to CFSAC and conduct our usual traditional matches. Then with a day or two change over, CFSAC would conduct its matches. It is not likely that civilians would be allowed to compete in CFSAC... details to follow when we have them.

The 2006 Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championships

The 124th Annual Prize Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, the Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championships (CFRC), was conducted at Connaught Ranges between the 18th and 30th of August, 2006. The Meeting this year was sub-divided into three parts: the 'normal' TR and F Class Championships; the "America" International Match for TR and F Class Teams; and the "F Class Open Tournament". Each of these will be covered briefly in this report.

We were very pleased welcome TR teams from Germany, Great Britain and the United States, F Class Teams from England, Germany, the Republic of Ireland and the United States, along with individuals from these countries and from Australia, Bermuda, Jamaica, and Scotland. These, joined with entries from across Canada, the British Cadet Rifle Team (the Athelings), Canadian and UK (ACF) Cadets, and many Cadet Instructors, resulted in a good level of entry, though it was not quite as high as had at one time been expected. Some anticipated entries in advance of next year's World Championship did not, in the end, materialise. The expense and complication of flying around the world with firearms present great difficulties for competitive shooters. In addition, we still face problems from competing events in the USA, with the Camp Perry and Spirit of America (Raton) Meetings, just before and after the CFRC, and the now annual US F Class Championships in October. There is little we can do to remove such competition, except to run the best possible series of matches and thereby entice shooters to come to us and not to them! To those of our American friends who do attend our matches, we offer our appreciation. And you now that you NEVER have to go into the butts!

The CFRC

The schedule was modified this year as a trial in advance of the large entry expected in 2007. Changes were made in the Long Range Challenge and the 223/556 Championship, with both of these, along with the Sierra ISSF Championship being held entirely on the first day. Entries in the Challenge and the 223/556 showed modest increases, but the Sierra was much lower than usual. A review of the future of the latter event needs to be conducted for the 2008 Meeting. Some changes were also made in the warm-up matches, the Patron's was dropped as a separate event, and the Coaches Match was put on hold for a couple of years. By and large, the trial was a success, in that the matches ran very smoothly, and there were very few comments or complaints. For most individual shooters, very little changed at all; it is only the organisers who suffer from heartburn and ulcers.

We continued with last year's introduction "Short Course" Aggregates, with an "Early" one over the first few days and a "Late" one towards the end. These are primarily intended to encourage newer shooters to "sample" the CFRC and also to allow those who cannot complete the full programme to get in some very solid days of shooting. Although the entries were not large, we intend, if possible, to continue with these in 2007.

Keith Bornn and Gordon Caffery were our joint CROs, and this proved to be an excellent combination. They were assisted by a capable group of ROs and AROs, with some old and some new faces. And, as always, the schoolgirl markers from Smiths Falls, under CBO Pat Quinn, did an excellent job. Their wonderful standard of butt marking excellence adds a great deal to the success and enjoyment of the competition. Andrew Good again served as our QM. He and his crew did and excellent job in overcoming the challenges, foreseen and unforeseen, which go along with this vital task. We always assume that there will be targets in place where and when we want them - but we seldom pause to ask how this is achieved. The Connaught Staff again provided invaluable support, in many ways unseen by and unknown to the majority of competitors. And the permanent DCRA Staff, along with those who joined us for the matches, performed in noble fashion, often under very rushed and difficult circumstances. Thank you, Betty Ann Ferguson, Peter Vaughan and Bill Plouffe, as well as Sandy Kirkpatrick. I would again like to thank Daniel Chisholm who ran the squadding software, and produced all the squadding data in good time. Peter ran the scoring programme, and once again results were posted very quickly - both at the range or on the web site.

As has been my practice for several years, I wrote a report each evening which went on to the DCRA web site, along with the daily results. Since these reports may be read in all their gory detail on the web site, as may the full results of all events, I will not strain your patience here. A summary of the major prize winners may be found elsewhere in this issue.

We were very fortunate this year with the weather. During the CFRC we had rain on only one morning, mostly before the shooting had started and in the late afternoon. The day of the America Match was a little different, but I'll cover that below. For most of the time, the winds were generally light, with relatively small changes. Some of the relays, including mine, in the 900 metre Alexander of Tunis had a difficult time, but compared with previous years this was a fairly benign one. As a result of this, and some excellent marksmanship, scores were high all week.

The tradition of the Macdonald Stewart Dinner was continued at the Chateau Laurier on the last Friday evening. It was, as always, a very fine evening, and we were all delighted that Mrs. Liliane Stewart was able to attend this year. The Macdonald Stewart Museum again provided a superb display of artifacts and antique firearms.

The annual cofffeee(sic-hic) match between Colin Brown and Jim Thompson ended in a tie: each won nine ranges and one was drawn.

The major team honours went to Great Britain, who won both the Canada and Commonwealth Matches, as well as the Outlander. The USA won the F Class Lum Trophy. Canada won both the Under-25 Team Matches.

The Canadian Cadets won the Michael Faraday. Ontario won both the inter-provincial team matches. David Luckman won the Grand Aggregate, Jim Murphy the F Class Grand for the second

year in a row, Vanessa Warner became the first lady to win the F Class Governor General's Final and David Calvert won the Governor General's Prize. To all competitors, whether prize winners or not, we offer our congratulations on some very good shooting.

All in all, the 124th DCRA Prize Meeting was a successful one. There are always areas for improvement, and we invite all members to offer their views. All constructive suggestions will be considered.

The America Match

With the approval of the NRA of the USA, the America Match was fired on Sunday 27th August. This match started here in 2002 and was held in Raton in 2004. We were also pleased to host, at the invitation of the US F Class Team, an F Class Match following the America Match course of fire.

Four teams took part in each match: TR teams from Canada, Germany, Great Britain and the USA; and F class Teams from Canada, England, Germany and the USA. Full scores are on the DCRA web site. Thanks to Karen and Iain Robertson, a continuous live update of scores was made available on the internet. We do not know how many people around the world hooked into this, but the aim will be to do the same in 2007.

The major problem in the early part of the day was rain. Following completion of the 300 yard range, with teams all set to go at 600 yards, the heavens opened causing a significant delay. There was much anxious studying of weather radar, which showed that the disturbance was moving east, but all too slowly for comfort. In the end, the chance was taken, an early lunch break was declared, the rain did stop and the last three ranges were successfully completed in the afternoon. In the TR Match, Great Britain had an excellent shoot, winning the trophy by 17 points form the USA, who overtook Canada at the last range. The F Class Match was won by the USA by 18 points over Germany.

We were very pleased to welcome Colonel Steven Czepiga, US Army Attaché to Canada, who presented the two trophies and medals following the match. The DCRA had commissioned new medals for this event, manufactured with skill and precision in Switzerland.

The F Class Tournament

Just under 100 shooters then enjoyed a further three days of shooting, all at 900 metres. About half were in the F(Open) Class, with a sizeable group of TR shooters and a small number of F(F). A reduced target was used for all the matches, with the 500 yard centre pasted on to the long range face. This produced a 5.25" v-bull, and a 10.5" bull, approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ minute and 1 minute respectively, and fairly close to the dimensions currently under discussion in ICFRA. And it proved to be quite a challenge! For the TR and F(F) shooters, by the magic of computer wizardry, scores were 'converted' with vees and 5s becoming vees, 4s becoming 5s, etc. The converted scores thus resembled those that would have been made on the normal long range target.

Over the three days, individuals fired 15 shots 8 times at 900 metres, with the top 40 qualifying for a 20 shot final. There was also a team match each day, for teams of 4 shooters. Prizes were awarded on each day's scores, as well as for the individual and team aggregates in each class.

The team prizes were won by USA Red in F(O), "Farkey's Friends" in F(F) and GB #4 in TR. The open Grand Aggregate was

won by Larry Bartholome, F(F) by Dale Rathwell, and TR by David Luckman.

All in all, it was a successful and enjoyable three days of shooting. The atmosphere was friendly and relaxed, but the competition was keen. We thank Paul Reibin and Sinclair International for donating special awards. The new medal design was also used for these events and seemed to be well received.

It has been suggested that this event might be repeated in 2008. It could be, given sufficient interest and support. We would like to hear from all those who might be interested, from Canada or around the world.

And now for 2007!



The Kelvinside Academy "Canada" Experience - 2006!!

Once a year, since time began, the "shooting schools" of Great Britain meet at Bisley for "Schools' Week", where as members of the Combined Cadet Force, they compete in a form of "target rifle" shooting using 7.62mm bolt-action rifles known as L81A2, but wearing full combat suits. One wonders at the connection between target rifles and combat suits, but that's the way it is. Our school has taken part for many decades, usually with modest results, as we are a small school, with a small shooting group, and no means to select a best team from a great pool of kids. In fact, we take every shooter we have, and even at that we added one little one to bring our numbers up.

Arriving at Bisley in very good time in the afternoon of Sunday 9th July 2006 after a 420 mile mini-bus-and-trailer run, once again we set up "camp" in front of the Macdonald Stewart Pavilion, hereinafter referred to as "Canada", because that's what everyone calls it! Usually, which means for the last thirty years or so, the next step is to leave the NRA camp to feed the kids, involving travelling, time, and no little expenditure. Anyone who has not paid for the food a dozen teens can scoff should keep a tight hold on his purse if the occasion arises! This year, courtesy of Mrs Marion Evans of Canada, we avoided wasting time and effort travelling, and we exchanged our dinner money for a good sit-down dinner in Canada. Now, kids may be kids, but stupid they are not. The choices were greasy fish suppers or Chinese 'carryouts' at a street corner miles away in Aldershot, or a sit-down dinner 20 yards away in Canada. So, we dined in Canada, in style, but under the very watchful eyes of the Canadian Team. Invasion by Kids was probably not top of that team's wish list, and one can understand that. However, our kids know how to behave at table - and they know the only alternative is "outside, now". And yet, despite this happy situation, there was a tension in the air, something was amiss. The kids had a BIG problem. Where could they find a television set so they could watch the World Cup Final?




As they dined, the TV in the ante-room was on, and so was the first half. Panic was closing in. Also closing in was the impressive figure ("He looks VERY SCARY!" - anon) of Mr. Pat Vamplew, who came to the rescue, asking the right question, "Who wants to watch the football?". ALL the kids' hands shot up. "OK ... "said Pat, "... and who is supporting the right team, FRANCE?" Only one hand did not shoot up - Miss Ting Wu - who looked Mr Vamplew square in the eye while he exclaimed "OH NO ...!" It seemed our Ting had a small Italian logo on her shirt, reason enough to support Italy. After all, if one is from

Beijing, what's the difference? All the kids (except Ting) were ushered into a semi circle in front of the TV. Ting was sent to sit at the back, where she promptly took over a huge comfortable armchair. She told me later she was hoping it was Pat's chair ... and he was going to have a problem getting it back!

The scene was wonderful, and I hope the Canadians enjoyed the atmosphere as much as our kids appreciated being allowed to watch the final in such style. Outstanding memories include that every time Pat Vamplew left the room to get another small glass of water, some significant event took place. He missed them all, even the infamous head-butt. It was great fun, and I am sure the kids will remember it for a long time. After that the kids went for a walk-about, and then to bed.

Each morning we breakfasted in Canada, and on our last night we dined there again. Being invited in to Canada is akin to being invited in to someone's home. It's an honour not to be abused, and to be cherished. In a word, the privilege transforms our Bisleys from a rough-and-ready camping and shooting expedition into an entirely civilised grown-up business. I mean, if one compares the scene in the photograph with one's vision of cornflakes on clammy plastic plates outside tents in the rain, the thing is set in perspective! Apart from all that, we have to spend money to feed the kids (Damn!) and it pleases us if we can spend it usefully in Canada. Somehow, there seems to be a double benefit in that. It seems so obvious now.



We had our dinner night, again in Canada, and what a fine dinner that was. It simply rounded-off what had been a wonderful week for a dozen teenagers from a school in Glasgow, who, for whatever reason had taken a fancy to rifle shooting, rather than any of the other more ball-orientated sports options. They gave their all over the winter season shooting the local smallbore league (Zoë was Junior Individual Champion) and set about Bisley 2006 with a confident professionalism that was a joy to behold and be part of. The contribution to our enjoyment made by the Canadian Team members, Pat Vamplew, Mike Wong Shui, Stan Frost, Julie Belanger, Gordon Launcelot et al cannot be under-stated, nor being in the inspiring company of others, such as Queen's Prize winners Alain Marion and Jim Paton. Thanks, Canada, you did us proud, and we are very grateful indeed for your generosity and hospitality.

The 125th CFRC and the World Long Range Championships

Question: how many other Canadian organisations, sporting or otherwise, can celebrate their 125th anniversary of competition, let alone their 125th year of existence? The DCRA was founded in 1868, so we will be 139 years old in 2007. Please let your MP, MPP, MLA, and local representatives know about this to remind them of our long and distinguished record of competitive rifle shooting competitions and responsible firearms use.

Although, at the time of writing, the Executive Committee has not yet held its Autumn Meeting to decide on the final arrangements for 2007, it is likely that the schedule and programme utilised in 2006 will be to a very large degree repeated in 2007. We are encouraged to do this by the virtual absence of criticism or comment about the 2006 CFRC. It is therefore only likely that there will be changes if there is unexpected divergence from the predicted levels of entry in either individual or team events. Full details, as well as individual entry forms, will be in the next issue of the *Canadian Marksman* and will be posted on the DCRA web site early in the New Year.

At this stage, the following should be noted:

- * The CFRC in 2007 will start one day earlier than usual on Thursday (16th August) rather than the normal Friday. All events during the first week will be moved one day earlier.
- * Thursday 23rd August is designated as a "rest or rescue" day there will either be no shooting at all, or some portion of the day may be used to make up for lost time due to bad weather or other circumstances earlier in the week, and/or to try to anticipate severe weather in advance, if it is forecast. We sincerely hope that this will be a day of rest for both competitors and staff!
- * The normal schedule (the Gatineau, the conclusion of the Grand Aggregate, the Commonwealth Match, etc.) will resume on Friday 24th August.
- * <u>Individual entry fees</u> will be the same as, or will rise only slightly from, the 2006 levels.
- * The World Veterans, Under 25 and Under 21 team Championships will be held on Sunday 26th August.
- * The Individual World Long Range Target Rifle Championship will be fired from Monday 27th to Thursday 30th August.
- * The World Long Range Team Championship for the "Palma" trophy will be fired on Friday 1st and Saturday 2nd September.
- * The DCRA "Connaught Match" will be fired along side the Palma.
- * Further details of the World Championship Events are provided in a separate article in this issue of the *Canadian Marksman*, and will be posted on the DCRA web site.


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

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
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Owing to Larry Fish's somewhat oblique and strained relationship with his computer, his column in the last issue of Canadian Marksman was unfortunately truncated.

Also, and for the same reason, it was not his final column.

Since readers indicate continuing interest, the column will remain until readers, or Larry, become exhausted, whichever happens first.

With ear-muffs on and staying in the aim, Arnold had no knowledge of the excited buzz going on behind us. During those last two shots the wind became unstable and the mirage presented some rapidly distorting images. In each instance, when it steadied, I reached over, corrected the sight to accommodate the new effect and said to Arnold, "In 3 seconds, go!" Each time he rapped in a bull's eye. As the last shot was indicated a loud roar of applause thundered from behind us and I turned to see a large gathering literally jumping with excitement. Johnny Johnston ran up onto the firing point. "You've done it, lads! By two points!" he cried. "We've won the Kolapore!"

I shook hands with Arnold, who had shot brilliantly, and attempted to help him with his shooting gear, but team members, opponents and spectators swarmed to offer congratulations. It was a great finish. Johnnie Johnston was beside himself. "It's the first time Canada has won the Kolapore in eighteen years!", he exhulted. "We were in a dead heat with the Brits going into the last two shots and their shooter lost a point on each. Well done, lads!", he choked emotionally as he flung his arms around us.

There was great excitement at the team's lunch that noon, but another hurdle faced us that afternoon when we would be competing for the 900 and 1000 yard McKinnon Challenge Trophy Cup against four other national teams.

The adrenalin rush of our Kolapore win was still in evidence as twelve of us started the 900 range. We romped through it and on to the 1000 to emerge as clear winners, by 6 points against the next hightest team, Scotland. In winning, we had also won the National Rifle Association of Zambia's trophy which was shot concurrently. Canada had made a clean sweep of all four international team matches: the Overseas, the Rajah of Kolapore, the McKinnon and the Zambia.

Later and personally, having failed to make a place in the Queen's Hundred, I had made a place in the St. George's Final Stage in which I strung 11 straight bullseyes on score placing me in contention for 1st place. Shooting an inner on my 12th shot, I was unable to get back into the bullseye, paying dearly. Nonetheless,

my score was sufficient to win a St. George's badge and, in the Grand Aggregate, a bronze cross.

The '69 team photo still hangs in my den. Inscribed above it is the late Johnnie Johnston's declaration: "The Greatest Team in Our Time".

Shortly after my St. George's disappointment, fellow team mate, Don Keizer of B.C., was in contention to win the Queen's Prize when, on his very last shot he was caught in the instant before firing by a wind shift dropping him into fourth place. So agonizingly close and with it the possibility of a '69 team Canadian winning the Queen's.

At the presentation of prizes we collected our awards which for me and the Lorne Scots, was one unique gold medal, 5 silver medals, 1 bronze cross and 2 badges. There were also good hauls for most of the other team members especially those who had shot on the international team matches. One of these was a first year man, Trooper Alain Marion. This quiet Quebecer would eventually become a Canadian shooting icon and the scourge of Bisley where he would astonish and disturb the British by winning their coveted Queen's Prize no less than three times! As of this writing, he still appears to be at the top of his form.

A wild evening of celebration followed the final, team dinner, which was barely completed when the Queen's winner was carried into the Pavilion on the sedan chair. At least, this winner did not fall into the fireplace as he retrieved the white Stetson and the cigarette from the buffalo's head and mouth.

I remember that last night as something of a blur. At one point I walked around the Pavilion and discovered our ancient naval cannon gaily festooned with toilet paper and swung into position with the muzzle pointing directly into the Commandant's sitting room through a French window. Fortunately the flash-pan had long since been welded over. As of this writing I understand that the old cannon is back in operation and good for a spectacular blast. As the aircraft climbed to take us home, the next morning, there remained but one conclusion: '69 was the best damn team any of us had ever been on.

On returning to Connaught , for the '69 DCRA, I seemed to have lost the edge as my scores were about a point below the mark to make the '70 team, which I did not. Notwithstanding, the Team Captain of the international Canada Match asked me to be one of the coaches to the 8-member Canadian team against Great Britain and the USA. With misgivings about my suitability, considering my own scores, I succumbed to his persuasion and accepted.

The match saw Canada make a record-breaking score averaging almost 49 of 50 for each shooter over all ranges. We beat the British comfortably and the Americans overwhelmingly. My last shooter, Olympic Champion Gerry Oullette, ran straight bullseyes to his last shot at the final range, 600 yards, then the wind flags started gyrating. Fortunately we had plenty of time left on the clock and were able to wait it out. His last shot bulls-eye gave Gerry a perfect score at all three ranges; 150 of a possible 150!

INTO THE '70's

Over the last couple of years Lorne Scots had lost quite a number of team members due to job transfers, domestic demands, interest in other elements of the shooting discipline and interest in other fields. One of our greatest losses was the departure of Derek O'Dell who had not only been a solid, dependable team shooter, but also our armourer whose expertise in the craft was likely

unparalleled across the land. In fact, he would probably have been an outstanding marksman making places on Bisley teams if he had not devoted so much time to looking after our team's rifles. Fortunately, his assistance to the team in that regard did not disappear with his departure.

With the general shift to commercial arms, the Regiment financed the purchase of a Schultze-Larsen built around a Mauser action. Derek took the raw production model and showered it with his special talents transforming it into a veritable extension of the firer's physique. This and an endless procession of technical assistance from him made Derek almost as great a contributor as when he was with the team and shooting top line scores.

At the '70 ORA, Lorne's team member, John McDonald continued his early success by winning, in his Expert class, the President's, the City of Toronto, both the Saturday and Monday Aggregates then capped it off by winning the Lieutenant-Governor's Prize for the bronze and silver medals. I placed top total score of the prize meeting by winning the Mercer Agg'; my second time as the Ontario Champion.

Two weeks later, John, Steve Dorsey and I headed for Montreal to attend the Province of Quebec's annual prize meeting at Mount Bruno. There was plenty of opposition including the British team and the just returned Canadian Bisley team. We had good shooting and managed to crowd the top of the prize list, but no first places for any of us. We consoled ourselves by spending Saturday evening in Montreal strolling like a trio of boulevadiers savouring the delightful sights of this beautiful, cosmopolitan city. With his fluent French, Steve piloted us smoothly and effortlessly through Anglo-French interactions and gave us a new perspective on life.

Moving on to the DCRA, we endured a weeklong heat wave laced with high index humidity. The target rifle matches progressed under stupefying heat with a shoot, drink, shower drill repeated with almost every range shot. John McDonald and I shot neck and neck for most of the meet until John suffered a major disaster in the 1000 yards Alexander of Tunis match. For John it was a disappointing blow as he was shooting on a level to place him in the top half of the Bisley team. But those maximum ranges have ruined many a promising aggregate. My scores also took a nosedive from 4th in the Grand Agg'. By competition's end I had joined John as a Bisley team also-ran. But quietly plugging away with good, solid scores was our Chuck Jones who finally wound up as high member of the Lorne Scots contingent and a slim chance of a place on the '71 Bisley team. Unfortunately for Chuck, not enough qualifiers cancelled out to allow him a place. Little did I know, at this point, that I would never be on a Bisley team again owing to various circumstances including the collapse of my industry. And later, being assigned to develop and train a Central Militia Area team to compete in a new venture: the Reserve Force Small Arms Competitions (REFSAC) for service conditions shooting.

The World Long Range Championships, August 2007 Individual Entries

Dr. Jim Thompson Match Director 2007 World Long Range Championships

These notes are directed particularly to Canadian shooters, but they apply equally to shooters from all other countries.

There has been a little confusion as to who is eligible to apply for and shoot in the Individual World Championship. It is hoped that this will be clarified in these notes.

- 1. If you are a member of the designated Canadian "squad" for the Palma, Veterans, Under 25 and Under 21 Team Championships, you are automatically eligible for a place in the Individual Championship. You are responsible for your own entry and entry fee. As soon as the "squads" are named, either your Team Captain or Manager or you should fill in the pre-registration form (before 31 December 2006) or the full entry form (from 1 January 2007) and return it to the DCRA. The pre-registration fee is \$100 and the full entry fee is \$300. Those who have pre-registered may deduct \$100 from the full \$300 fee.
- 2. If you are not on one of the official squads, but if you were in the top 100 of the last Individual World Championship fired at Bisley in 2003, you are also automatically eligible for a place in the 2007 Championship. You should fill in the preregistration form (before 31 December 2006) or the full entry form (from 1 January 2007) and return it to the DCRA. The preregistration fee is \$100 and the full entry fee is \$300. Those who have pre-registered may deduct \$100 from the full \$300 fee.
- **3.** All others wishing to apply to shoot in the Individual World Championship should do so as follows:
- a. You should fill in the pre-registration form (before 31 December 2006) or the full entry form (from 1 January 2007) and return it to the DCRA. The pre-registration fee is \$100 and the full entry fee is \$300. Those who have pre-registered may deduct \$100 from the full \$300 fee.
- b. The DCRA will check that your standard of shooting is appropriate for entry in the World Championship. If you are not known to the DCRA, your PRA will be asked to assist in this. You will be advised as quickly as possible whether your application has been accepted.

- we should make it quite clear that all individual applications that are endorsed by the DCRA (or competitor's home NRA) will be considered, no matter what is the shooter's classification. Only in the very unlikely event that the range capacity is reached will any sort of choice have to be made. Once an application has been verified and accepted, that individual is "in" the Championship and may plan accordingly. We will not "bump" such individuals in favour of later entries. We will advise all pre-registrants by 31 December 2006 of the status of their registration.
- d. After the pre-registration deadline, 31 December 2006, entries will be very much on a first-come first served basis, after provision has been made for official team "squads". Space may be quite limited, so we strongly advise early registration and entry.
- e. All applicants should note that pre-registration deposits and entry fees are non-refundable except when the application is not accepted or in cases of documented illness or other personal crisis.

The final full entry form will be available on the DCRA web site by the end of December 2006 and will be published in the next issue of *The Canadian Marksman*. It will also be sent directly to all those who have pre-registered. The web site will also show any late changes in these procedures and/or in the overall programme for the World Championships.

We are hoping for a large entry of target rifle shooters from around the world, and especially from Canada. Any queries on any aspects of the World Championship should be directed to the Match Director, c/o DCRA.

In appreciation

As usual the success of this year's competition was attributable in no small way to the tireless efforts and organizational talents of both the DCRA and Connaught Range staff. Particular thanks should be extended to, among others, Betty-Ann Ferguson, Peter Vaughan, Gord Caffery, Pat Quinn and his cadre of markers, and MWO Chuck Courtremanche for their assistance in making the CFRC experience an enjoyable one.

NBPC 2006

This year was memorable for many reasons, not the least of which was benign, if hot, conditions for the first two days of competition. 2006 also saw the return of two well known international competitors, Dave Gullo (proprietor of Buffalo Arms Inc.) and Davis Hicks, both of the US, and the arrival of three newcomers, Bob Albert of Ottawa, Dan Wescott of the US, and most notably Davis' son Cody, whose spectacular performance at his first long range match will be noted in due course.

Scores from Friday's short range course of fire were close, with positions of the top three competitors at 300 and 500 yards settled by count back, and a one point spread between the first and third at 600. By days end, the Short Range Aggregate was taken by Davis Hicks with a 139V6, followed by his son Cody with 133V6 and Dave Gullo with 130V7.

Friday's program concluded with the Wilf Black 200 yard match, shot with original military or sporting rifles. Gold and silver were awarded to Tom Matpack and Bob Gleason respectively, with both using Springfields. Third place went to Glenn Kaye with his Peabody.

Friday's matches also included the Loyalist Cup short range three-person concurrent team match, this year taken by The Mixed Up Clowns (Davis Hicks and Dave Gullo of the US, and Chris Jones of Canada) with a 389V16, followed by The Green Mountain Boys (Don Hamilton, Cody Hicks, and Dan Wescott) with 381V12. Third place and bronze medals were awarded to the OF's (the reader can interpret this abbreviation as he or she sees fit) consisting of long time NBPC competitors Rich Beyer, Bob Gleason and Tom Matpack of the US with 348V8.

Saturday's long range matches were as closely contested as those of the day prior. Notable were Dave Gullo's win at 700 meters with a 49V5, newcomer Dan Wescott's third at 800 meters with a 45V2 (missing second place by count back to Davis Hicks), and Don Hamilton's win at 900 meters with a 43V2, a mere one V-bull ahead of Dave Gullo.

The Ranger Cup long range concurrent team match was awarded to the Green Mountain Boys (again, including newcomers Cody Hicks and Dan Wescott, and veteran Don Hamilton), with second place to The Mixed Up Clowns and third to The OF's.

When the smoke cleared after another fine day of shooting, the Long Range Aggregate was awarded to Dave Gullo with a 138V7, followed by Davis Hicks with 133V5 and son Cody with 130V4.

The Grand Aggregate and North American Trophy winner for 2006 was Davis Hicks with 272V11, ahead of Dave Gullo's 269V14 and (once again) Cody Hicks 263V10.

Our luck with the weather ran out for Sunday mornings International Team Match. A blustery east wind and rain were accompanied by a drop in temperature which confounded several competitors with a requirement for increases of anywhere from 9 to 13 minutes above the previous days 900 meter elevations. An eye on the rain and the prospect of battling incipient rust led to the decision to shoot the match as three 900 meter stages instead of the normal single 700, 800 and 900 meter stages of years past to minimize exposure to the elements for both shooters and equipment.

And once again, Team USA trounced Team Canada, 631V19 to 427V9. Despite tricky conditions, Davis Hicks finished what must have been a satisfying weekend of shooting with a 47V4 in the final 900.

Notes for the technically inclined

Long range black powder has historically been dominated by .44 to .45 caliber cartridges with long, heavy bullets (typically from 500 to over 550 grains in the .45s). Given this fact some readers will doubtless be surprised to note the Hicks' decision to compete this year with the following calibers, bullets and loads (rises are included for the amusement of TR readers).

While the attraction of lighter bullets and loads with their attendant reduction in recoil is obvious, results beyond short to mid range have been indifferent until recently. Experimenters found brass (with a few notable exceptions) difficult to procure or fabricate, and bullets with weights and ballistic coefficients adequate to the task at hand unavailable. BCPR silhouette competitors in particular found a smaller caliber alternative attractive, and were the motivating force behind development and availability of moulds such as those noted above for heavy-for-caliber, high .BC bullets.

A happy consequence of this is softer shooting and easily procurable cartridge/bullet combinations capable of competing with the more traditional heavyweights at long range as well, with 40-65 becoming the dominant choice.

Originally offered in the Winchester 1886 repeater, the 40-65 became the most successful of the several dozen .40 caliber black powder cartridges introduced during the latter half of the 19th century, surviving in the marketplace until the 1930's. It differs from other period cartridges of similar capacity, however, insofar as it is easily reformed from commonly available (and inexpensive) 45-70 brass or acquired in quantity through specialty brass suppliers such as Starline. Either overcomes what had previously confounded efforts to compete effectively with smaller bores without incurring excessive costs.

Whether or not a precedent is being set with this year's competition remains to be seen...



Some final thoughts

Davis Hicks' Grand Aggregate score for this years' competition represents a new record high for the NBPC, beating the previous high Grand by one point. Cody's third place finish also represents something of a record in that to my knowledge he is the youngest competitor to have ever placed in the top three. His participation was a sixteenth birthday present from his dad, and one that I'm confident will be memorable.

The apple obviously didn't fall far from the tree...

It was satisfying to see an infusion of new blood this year, which thankfully included a Canadian, as well as the return of several long time program supporters. First timers inevitably express delight with the venue, the program offered by DCRA, and the assistance and advice cheerfully offered by other competitors and DCRA staff.

All are to be congratulated for contributing to a hard fought and thoroughly enjoyable competition.

And I'll close with an unsolicited observation from Davis Hicks, a long time proponent of the NBPC and international competitor of note: "...as far as I'm concerned, you put on the best long range match in the world!"

Thanks to all for your support. We'll see you again next year.


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

ITEM 1 - OPENING REMARKS

1. The Chairman offered greetings to all on behalf of the President who was unable to attend. He explained that MGen de Faye was away on a business trip but that he would be with us for the Prize Ceremony. He also noted that the main purpose of the meeting was to hear from the members any concerns and suggestions they might have.

ITEM 2 - APPROVAL OF MINUTES - 21 AUGUST 2005 SAGM

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MOTION 15/06 It was moved by Mr. Paul Reibin and seconded by LCol (Ret'd) Bill Molnar that the Minutes of the 21 August 2005 SAGM be approved, as presented. CARRIED

ITEM 3 - RECENT ACTIVITIES

2006 Bisley Team Report

- 3. The Bisley Team 2006 report will be provided by the Commandant at a later date.
- 4. At the request of Mr. Serge Bissonnette it was agreed that the names of Derek Daines and Sandy Peden, who were seconded as coaches to the 2005 Canadian Team, are to be added officially to the team list and that the NRA of UK be so informed. 2006 NSCC
- 5. In the absence of the NSCC Chairman the Executive Director reported on the successful conduct of the 2006 NSCC. A copy of the report is attached.
- 6. Mr. Serge Bissonnette recorded a vote of thanks to Keith Cunningham and the DCRA Staff for conducting the NSCC and keeping this competition going despite the cancellation of the military CFSAC.

ITEM 4 - NEW BUSINESS

Match Committees

7. The chairman reported that the 2006 Match and Des Burke Committees had been selected at the 18 August 2006 Executive Committee meeting and that the committee members' names are posted on the official notice board.

Volunteers

8. The Executive Officer outlined the need for volunteer helpers at the Matches this year and in 2007. The offer of assistance by Mr. David Rumbold to run the Governor General's leader board was accepted with thanks.

Patches and Discs

- 9. In response to a query the Programme Director advised that more discs and patches had been ordered and received. Bisley Assessment
- Mr. John Chapman advised that he had been surprised to learn that individual entry fees were not covered by the team assessment. It was agreed that this needs to be even more clearly stated than is now in the administrative paperwork team members receive.

Team Designation

11. Mrs. Patricia Dahlstrom noted that in the Bisley results listings that our team was listed as DCRA vice Canada, Mr. Stan Frost noted that this has been dealt with the UK NRA in 2002 but that they have overwritten the entry in their programme. The matter will be taken up with the NRA again.

Bisley Team Administration

- 12. The need to standardize the administration and financial workings of the team was expressed by several members. ICFRA Rules
- 13. Mr. Paul Reibin commented on draft ICFRA F Class rules. He stated that BCRA is in favour of relaxed, vice rigid rules. The F Class rules are to be obtained from Mr. Dan Chisholm when available and posted on the DCRA web site for review and comment.

DCRA Expansion

14. Mr. Peter Dobell commented that long distance ranges are just not available in each provincial area and the DCRA does not yet offer competition in other disciplines. It was mentioned that the DCRA postal programme for small bore and air rifle is still offered and that we rely on the PRAs to promote it to clubs.

Cadet Relations

- 15. Mr. Pat Vamplew noted that for a number of reasons the Cadet Camp Commandant has imposed restrictions on cadets competing as part of a PRA team. He has softened his stance on not permitting this to happen on the condition that PRAs ask permission in writing, 48 hours in advance, for cadets by name and team employment. It was agreed that the Executive Director would be the point of contact with LCol Sainsbury during the competition.
- 16. For the WLRC it was explained that Cadets will fund an U25 and U21 team and that LCol Sainsbury will fund Cadet Instructors but not cadets for the Individual competition. It was agreed that M. Alain Marion would develop a proposal for submission to LCol Sainsbury on the inclusion of cadets in the Individual match.

ITEM 7- ADJOURNMENT

17. A motion having been made by LCol (Ret'd) Molnar and seconded by M. Leo D'Amour the meeting adjourned.

FLIGHT LIEUTENANT (RET'D). MIKE PEARSON

We learned belatedly that FLt. (Mike) Pearson died on 23 July 2005. He hadn't shot for many years, but he and his wife often used to pop in at the ORA Annual Matches. According to records, he'd been a member since at least 1964.

JOHN PHILLIPS HOWARD

John Phillips Howard, beloved husband of Rosalie, passed away of Valley Fever in Phoenix, Arizona on Sunday, February 26, 2006 at the age of 66. Foremost, John loved long-range target shooting and spent many, many happy hours at the Sarcee Ranges and later at the Homestead Rifle Range, which he helped build. He traveled to other shooting ranges as a member of the Canadian Team, including England, South Africa and New Zealand. John was a member of two Canadian Palma Teams. His most cherished win was the 100 yard Corporation at Bisley.

MAURICE W. (MOE) NORMAN

Maurice W. Norman passed away peacefully in his 91st year at his home in Long Point, NB on March 17, 2006. Moe was born in Hampton on June 7, 1915, the son of the late Allen and Lillian (Gould) Norman. He is survived by his wife of 66 years Pauline. Moe served in the Canadian Army for 33 years. He was a well-loved fixture at the Canadian Championships at Connaught, demanding that the DCRA maintain a supply of DA ammunition for him when others were converting to handloads. His last international tour was to New Zealand and Australia in 1988. In later years he continued to serve as the local gunsmith.

DR. M. ELLEN MACGILLIVRAY

Dr.Marjorie Ellen MacGillivray passed away April 15, 2006. Born at South Devon on November 26, 1925, Ellen was the daughter of the late Robert MacLaggan and Marjorie Titus. She graduated from Fredericton High School in 1943 and earned her Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of New Brunswick graduating with the Class of 1947. She completed her Master of Science degree at University of Michigan in 1951 and after a few years in the work force she decided to further her studies in the Netherlands where she completed her doctorate at the University of Leiden in 1958.

Dr. M. Ellen MacGillivray received an honorary doctorate of Science degree at the University of New Brunswick on May 21, 1981. She was also honoured by the city she loved so dearly on March 17, 2005 as one of Fredericton's Distinguished Citizens.

Ellen dedicated much of her time to many organizations. She belonged to the Fredericton Tree Commission since 1961 serving as Chairman from 1996 until 2002. She was a charter member of the Fredericton Heritage Trust since 1972, the Nature Trust of New Brunswick since 1986, a member of the Canadian Forestry Association of New Brunswick since the mid-1960s and a life member of the York-Sunbury Historical Society. Very proud of her Scottish heritage, Ellen was a member of the Fredericton Society of Saint Andrew since 1963, serving in many different positions including President from 1979 to 1981. She also was a member of the New Brunswick Scottish Cultural Association since 1980, serving as Honorary Chieftain of the Highland Games and Scottish Festival in 1999.

Ellen was a member of the Royal New Brunswick Rifle Association since 1970, serving as a member of the Executive since 1975, and President from 1991 to 1993. The Association recognized Ellen's contributions by awarding her the Andy Gunter Meritorious Award in 1991. She also was a member of The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association since 1970 and named as Life Governor in 1994.

D.E. DON WHITEMAN

Don Whiteman was a valued member of the NRA of New Zealand, who competed in Canada several times. He was on three New Zealand Palma Teams and was Captain of the 1982 Team to Canada. He was also a warm host to Canadian Teams in New Zealand in the 1980s and 1990s. Don passed away in April at 81.

JOHN MALCOLM BUCHANAN

John Malcolm Buchanan was born in Scone NSW, 4th June 1924 the eldest of six (6), to JJG & Melba Buchanan (nee Baxter). Jack was married in 1950 to the late Patricia Mary Mackintosh of Hurstville. Jack enlisted in the AIF April 1942 underage at 17 years 10 months and served in Lae, Papua New Guinea with the 2nd Army Troops Company RAE as a Sapper. Discharged in 1946, a bout of malaria delayed plans to enter the NSW Police Force until late 1947 where he rose through the ranks to Detective Sergeant in the late 60's & 70's. Jack retired in 1982 as a Senior Inspector after 35yrs of dedicated service just like his father.

During his early police years Jack commenced rifle shooting, representing the NSW Police in the Dunlop Shield Teams competing around Australia. He absorbed himself in his sport, rifle shooting, competing interstate and in overseas matches, either, as part of a team or as an individual. New Zealand, January 1975 was his first overseas shooting trip, followed by Bisley, UK, Canada and America in July 1976, accompanying the Australian Team as a Goodwill member. Thereafter for 30 years he made a yearly pilgrimage to Trenthan, NZ and Bisley UK. He became a bit of a feature, part of the furniture in his 'tilley hat', moleskins and riding boots, relaxing with a cleansing ale at the London-Middlesex Club or the RAF Club, wondering why or how that 'Inner Four' or 'Miss' came about. Known for his gruff voice and no nonsense attitude, he developed friendships far and wide...Many an anecdote will be remembered in the butts at Bisley, in the bar at Upper Hut, New Zealand, Connaught Canada or Bloomfontein South

He will always be remembered for his very apt yet witty remarks, his generosity, his wisdom, and towards the end his noble and courageous spirit. Jack fired his last shot on the 29th April 2006 at the Hornsby range.

EDITH DYAS-BROWN

The target-shooting world lost a long-time competitor and supporter when Edith Dyas-Brown passed away at the end of May. Edith was born in England and started recreational shooting in 1948 while serving in the Women's Royal Air Force. She was a welcome addition to the Canadian shooting scene when Earl enticed her to Canada. Edith shot at Bisley seven times, most recently as a member of the 1995 Canadian Rifle Team. She competed in many Commonwealth countries, including the West Indies, Kenya, South Africa, New Zealand and Australia. She represented Canada on three Palma Teams. Edith won several Canadian Ladies' Championships and four Alberta Lieutenant Governor's Prizes. To foster interprovincial shooting relations, for many years she sponsored the Three Musketeers Match at the Prairie Provinces Championships, competed for by teams of three, one from each of the Prairie Provinces. In the past few years her health did not permit her to shoot but she continued to support Earl at every match. She will be greatly missed by her many friends in the PPRA, the DCRA and internationally. Our deepest sympathies go to her husband Earl.
